Dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

A friend of mine who has been overseas was asked to pass the enclosed letter on to you. I know nothing about the contents of the letter, though I understand it is from Mrs. Mary Dusaer, 148 Blvd. Emile Jacqmain, Brussels. She is anxious to present you with a beautiful piece of lace.

I am glad to be able to report that we had a very satisfactory meeting with Marshall Field in New York two weeks ago and that plans are going forward to begin publication of the magazine as soon as paper is available which we hope will be early next year. The next time I come to New York I'd like to have an opportunity to tell you all about it. I am to be connected with the magazine in an editorial capacity. I am organizing an editorial panel which each week will produce an editorial section which we hope will be the most distinguished and effective editorial expression in any mass circulation magazine in America. However, I am anxious not to be tied down too much by the housekeeping of editorship.
