

F.D.R. ELEVEN OPENS FOOTBALL SEASON SEPT. 20

The F.D.R. Football team rounded out its fourth week of practice Friday, with an intrasquad scrimmage.

While the starting assignments are far from settled, the keenest battle is being waged for all positions. They gave evidence of this Friday as head Coach Savage sent the squad through its first intrasquad scrimmage. All players on the field turned in satisfactory performances.

After the long intrasquad session, Coach Savage stated the F.D.R. gridmen never played together and are very green, but are practicing hard and will be in shape for the opening game.

Lt. Comdr. Savage is assisted by Ensign Rose, head line coach and Ensign Watkins in charge of the wingmen. All three coaches performed with Navy in former years;

The current Roosevelt team marks the first since the ship was commissioned 17 October 1945. There are sixty men on the squad.

Two contests in Philadelphia highlight the F.D.R. eight-game schedule which opens on Saturday, September 20 against the Oceana Naval Air Station.

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ALL PLANE PUSHERS NOTE

Heads Or Tails, Both Dangerous

(SEA) — Navy plane handlers are having their troubles. They've got to keep their heads about them if they don't want to wind up losing 'em.

After years of shunning the propeller end of parked airplanes, ground crewmen now find that they must avoid the rear ends, too. The combined heat and velocity of the exhaust from the tail of a jet plane can be just as dangerous as the whirling prop blades.

Burning or being thrown for a considerable distance by the blast are the two major dangers.

And, if all that isn't enough, the crewmen must also keep their eye on the air-intake scoops. The suction created in front of these scoops could suck them up against the entrv ducts.

SWIMMING MARKS TO BE ENTERED IN RECORDS

(SEA) Swimming qualifications will become a permanent entry in the service records of enlisted persons, BuPers Circ. Ltr. 136-47 (NDB, 31 JULY) announced. The entry will be made on page 4A-4B (Rev. 3-46) of the enlisted service record.

The entry must be made on the remaining original copy even if the duplicate page has already been forwarded to BuPers.

Swimmers will be divided into three classes. Minimum requirements for each group are as follows:

Third class: Enter the water feet first from a height of five feet and swim 50 yards.

Second class: Enter the water feet first from a height of 10 feet and remain afloat for 10 minutes. During this time, the man must swim 100 yards, using each of three strokes for a distance of 25 yards. Prerequisite for this class is qualification as swimmer, third class.

First class: Enter water feet first and swim under water for 25 yards, breaking surface for breathing twice during this distance at intervals of about 25 feet. Swim 220 yards, using any strokes desired. Remove trousers in water and inflate for support. While in the water the swimmer must approach a man his own size, demonstrate "break or release," get him in a cerry position and tow him 25 yards. Prerequisite for this class is successful completion of test for swimmer, second class.

AIRCREW MEN TO BE ENROLLED

(SEA) — Because of needs in the Navy's aeronautical organization, personnel who meet physical and mental requirements may enter class "A" aviation schools to make them eligible for selection as aircrewmen after a suitable amount of sea duty.

Unmarried personnel between 17 and 27 desiring to enlist in the regular Navy as apprentice seamen (aircrewman) will be processed for enlistment in accordance with instructions governing enlistment of other recruit applicants, except that they will be required to make a minimum score of 55 on the applicant qualification test and meet rigid physical requirements.

Personnel enlisting in this program will be entered in the Aviation Fundamentals School. From here they will go to an appropriate class "A" school.

NAVY MEN TO PAY INCOME TAXES AFTER 1 JAN. 1949

(SEA) — Effective 1 Jan 1949, enlisted service personnel will pay income tax in the same manner as civilians, under Public Law 334 (80th Congress).

The present exemptions—all pay of enlisted personnel and \$1,500 of officers' service pay—will remain effective through the calendar year 1948. Withholding tax also will be levied on service pay starting 1 Jan 1949.

The automatic deferment of income tax payments or returns for personnel at sea or on foreign service duty will be terminated not later than 31 Dec 1947. Members of the armed forces in this category have an automatic deferment until the 15th day of the sixth month following their return to the U. S. Personnel have been advised to file federal income tax returns for which they may be liable for all back years not later than 31 December.

Citizens of the U. S. serving in a possession of the U. S., either as a member of the armed forces of the U. S. or as an employee, when taken POWs or interned, shall be considered to have been within "a possession of the U. S." during their confinement by the enemy. This is true, even though the place of confinement may have been outside of a "possession of the U. S.," making them exempt from paying taxes.

P. L. 810 (80th Congress) stipulates that any compensation received by such POWs or internees during their imprisonment will be considered as compensation received "outside the U. S.," and will be exempt from tax. This can be applied to all taxable years after 31 Dec 1941.

EN TO PAY INCOME AFTER 1 JAN. 1949

Effective 1 Jan 1949, service personnel will pay in the same manner as under Public Law 334 (1947).

Exemptions—all pay personnel and \$1,500 of service pay—will remain through the calendar year following tax also will on service pay starting

Automatic deferment of payments or returns for at sea or on foreign duty will be terminated on 31 Dec 1947. Members of the armed forces in this have an automatic deferment the 15th day of the month following their return. Personnel have been file federal income tax for which they may be all back years not later December.

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(80th Congress) stipulate any compensation received for POWs or internees in imprisonment will be as compensation received by U. S. and will be exempt tax. This can be all taxable years after 1947.



The F.D.R. would like to welcome aboard our new chaplain, Carl M. Sittler, Commander, U.S. Navy who is the relief for Chaplain Charles A. O'Neill.

Chaplain Sittler was born on a farm near New Springfield, Ohio. He is a graduate of Thiel College, Greenville, Penna., and the Evangelical Lutheran Seminary, Capital University, Columbus, Ohio. He also studied at Ohio State University and the University of Southern California.

At the age of 18 he enlisted in the Army and served during World War I. He was pastor of Faith Lutheran Church, Youngstown, Ohio prior to accepting a commission as a Chaplain in the U.S. Navy in 1931. During the past 16 years he served on board the USS Melville, USS New Orleans, and the USS Maryland, and at Newport, R.I., Camp Elliott, San Diego, Calif., Naval Hospital, Long Beach and his last duty was Senior Chaplain at the U.S. Naval Base and Executive Vice President of the San Pedro - Long Beach Auxiliary Navy Relief Society.

During World War II Chaplain Sittler served on board the USS Maryland which took part in the invasion of Tarawa, Marshall and Saipan. The Maryland was torpedoed off Saipan.

Chaplain Sittler is a member of the American Lutheran Church and his present collateral duties aboard the Roosevelt are: Insurance and Savings Bonds Officer, Member of the Recreation Council, in charge of the
