Dear Madam:-

This is to thank you for your letter of March 16th. I beg your pardon for taking the liberty in writing you again, however, I deem it necessary to clarify an error.

The manuscript of my story, entitled "ALL MEN ARE CREATED EQUAL", which I have mailed to you together with two photostatic copies on March 3, 1947, has not been returned to my address, as you state in your letter of March 16th, but has been mailed to the Director of the Division of Human Rights of the United Nations, Lake Success, New York, because in the meantime I received a letter, dated April 11th, of the following contents:

The only reason inciting me to ask you this favor, is my aim to serve this matter,- and this is the true reason.

The officials mentioned in the letter of the Division of Human Rights are of course the late President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, his secretary, Mr. Stephen Early and Mr. Edward Stettinius, because I have mailed the original manuscript of my story to the late President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, in January 1944.
