We also wish to express our appreciation for the very fine column which you wrote in regard to St. Luke's. Mr. Sherwood provided us with a copy of your column as it appeared in the Washington paper. The publicity which the Arizona Times provided has also been of great value to the institution.

Mr. Sherwood continues to improve in health and surely is the picture of health. I understand he tips the scales at 192 at the present time. We are indeed happy to see a patient make as much rapid progress as he did, and only wish that more patients could do likewise; however, so many of them do not learn of their affliction in the real early stages.
