Dear Mrs Roosevelt:-

Nietzsche said that to live one must "live dangerously", and since I am in hearty agreement, I am emboldened to make a demand on your very busy life.

Another thing that prompts my request is that last term Lorraine Colville served efficiently as a student-teacher in our social studies department, and she spoke of knowing you and praised your generosity in serving the youth of our land.

And I knew, too, that you had accepted the invitation of Abraham Lincoln high school to address its student body, when you received the award they bestowed upon you.

My request is that on the morning of April 25th you address our large assembly of some several thousand girls. Washington Irving is one of the largest girls schools in our city. We have a present enrollment of some 5,700 girls, girls of many nationalities and many religions. The assembly meets on Friday from 9.25 to 10.15, and about three quarters of that time is given to the speaker.

The topic can be any of your choosing, but I might suggest any phase of the United Nations work, or the World Bill of Rights, or Women's place in our Atomic Age.

We can offer you, Mrs Roosevelt, no compensation other than a world of gratitude and a large, interested, and appreciate audience of future veterans and mothers.

Would you take a few hours from your crowded life and spend them with us?
