Dear Mrs. Roosevelt:



When I wrote to ex-Ambassador Ciechanowski, telling him the facts of the fishing trip, I was in hopes that he would admit his error, or at least say that his information had been inaccurate. However, he sticks to his story, as you will see by the enclosed photostatic copy of his letter. I thought you would be particularly interested in the reply.

I have written to General Marshall and ex-Secretary Byrnes, asking whether or not they have any objections to me releasing to the press my original letter to Ciechanowski. If they have none, it is my intention to give the facts to the press.

Dear Mr. McDonald,

The delay in answering your letter of February 12th, addressed to me c/o Doubleday and Company in New York, and of the copy of the same letter which you enclosed in your letter of February 18th addressed to my residence in Washington, was caused by my absence from Washington. I have found both your letters awaiting me on my return to Washington.

I am grateful to you for the kind interest you have shown in my book and for the information which you give me concerning President Roosevelt's fishing trip in Canada in the beginning of August, 1943, prior to the Quebec Conference.

It interested me greatly to know more about this aspect of that episode. While I have no doubt concerning the accuracy of your description of that trip, I can assure you that my sources of information on the meeting mentioned in my book are unimpeachable and that I still honestly have no doubt that it did take place. I am quite content to stand on my statement of these facts, confident that time will reveal and fully corroborate them. I recognize that secrecy on this subject was fully justified during the war to avoid giving information to the enemy. However, I fail to see any reason for the secrecy which still at present appears to surround this historic event.
