

The manager of our New York Hearing Aid Division, Miss Antonie Strassmann, has told me of the very interesting visit she had with you. I sincerely hope she was of real service to you.

You may be interested in a bit of history -- my interest in hearing aids started not only with my deaf ear, but with the Radio Nurse several of which I supplied to you quite some years ago for your family's children.

Miss Strassmann tells me that the radio you are using is quite an old one. I am taking the liberty of sending you one of our shortwave portables of which I saved a few for my friends. This model of portable has been a God-send to many of our men overseas. I am sure you are keenly interested in listening to foreign broadcasts if time permits. Even if you find no time to listen to shortwave, this radio will bring in the American stations as you should hear them.

I hope you will never hesitate to call on Miss Strassmann whenever she can be helpful. She will deem it a pleasure to be of service.
