Dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

Yesterday we applied a dormant spray on the Junipers and spruce trees at Val-Kill also Mr. Lenaka showed us the apple trees you wished sprayed; the orchard in the garden at Val-Kill, the orchard next to Arnold Berg's and the apple trees along the road across the main road from Arnold's. The cost of applying 5 sprays on these trees would be 200.00. It would be advisable to save the remaining four spray applications until after the bloom if you decide to have them sprayed. However all the trees need pruning badly. It is difficult to spray properly trees so dense as to prevent the entrance of the spray. If the trees are pruned the cost would be 190.00. If you have a good crop and market conditions are favorable the above mentioned pruning and spraying may be worth while. Since there was no time then to contact you we applied the dormant spray on these trees.

While we were spraying the evergreens at Val-Kill I had an opportunity to examine the other trees and would advise pruning all the willows, the oaks along the lake and feeding certain oaks, sycamores and the maple by the play house. This work would not exceed 250.00. If you prefer not to do all of the necessary pruning and feeding of the shade trees this year I would strongly advise pruning the willows and feeding the sycamores as the most urgently needed.

My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

I was one of those who wrote to congratulate you at the time of your appointment as one of our delegates to the United Nations Assembly in London. I was shocked to hear today that you are taking the same attitude as the legislators of 1864 in standing for equality before the law for the Negro race, while opposing it for women. The American Delegation, as I understand it, has gone on record as favoring the adoption of the principle of Equal Rights regardless of race. What a strange position the American Republic will be placed in if it stands for justice for Negroes and not for women.

If this, by any chance, takes place, the women of the world will turn elsewhere for leaders to champion their cause. Like the sun, hope will set in the West, and rise in the East.

I am mindful that you did not champion the cause of votes for women during the long years of struggle, nor the present fight for equal opportunity and equal economic status. However, I hope that you will, at least, not allow your personal feelings on these matters to influence the stand of the American Delegation. The plea that women are not prepared is equally applicable to men. You cannot learn to use a tool without first having it in your hand.
