I wanted to write you and say how much I enjoyed breakfast with you in New York. It means a great deal to me to have the chance to see and talk with you.

I hate to bother you further, but I notice on the guest list you gave me for the luncheon at the White House on Pearl Harbor Day that the President is listed as being present. However, I notice in the New Republic Supplement that Mrs. Hamlin says of the luncheon: "Eleanor was a few minutes late and a bit flustered. She said she was extremely sorry but the news from Japan was very bad and the President would be unable to have lunch with us."

This is a very little thing but I wonder if the President had received the news before the luncheon began. Lowell Mellett, who was there, remembers that he left the luncheon and got home again before he heard anything about the attack.
