
My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

Lord Greenwood was most generous in his reference to your address and said it was one of the finest ever delivered before the Pilgrims in London.



My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

Each day of working with displaced persons brings some fresh incident - amusing, pathetic or tragic.

One of the most recent occurred last week when one of our Ukrainians, Alex Bystriakiv, came to me with a request. He had painted a picture which he wanted to send to you in appreciation of your goodness to the Ukrainians.

I have consistently followed directives that we are not to use our postal privileges for unauthorized persons. In this instance I decided to make an exception and I did mail the package, with the fervent hope that you will not be required to pay duty on it.

I trust that you will forgive my presumption and understand something of what pleasure it gives to this artist to present you with a gift.
