Dear Miss Thompson:

I was delighted to have your letter of September 10, and to know that you are completely well and in your usual form again.

I had not thought that I would have an occasion so soon to write you again on business, but I have a request to make on behalf of Sir William Reid Dick, the distinguished British sculptor who has been commissioned to make the statue of President Roosevelt which we are so glad is to be erected here in Grosvenor Square. He is working from the best photographs he can get, but unfortunately has been unable to obtain any very satisfactory profile view. I wonder if you have one that Mrs. Roosevelt considers particularly good--or, even better, one taken from the right and another from the left. I know Sir William would greatly appreciate your help, and it is naturally of the greatest importance to have this statue as fine as he can make it.

My move to Mexico is a little slow in getting started, since I am still waiting for the Foreign Service Officer who is taking over my work in London. It looks at present as though I shall be getting under way early in December, and if it is at all possible I certainly hope to see you and Mrs. Roosevelt on my way through the United States.
