Dear Mrs: Roosevelt:

Your letter of April 18th has been received, and I regret the delay in replying to it earlier.

I fully appreciate your wish to see the idea of your great husband to be carried out in regard to painting a portrait which you mentioned in your letter. Since President Truman has already received a letter from Premier Stalin, in which the Generallissimo replied that did not have time to sit for a portrait, I do not feel it convenient to bring this question to his attention again, knowing that the sitting for a portrait is not in practice of the Generallissimo, I ask you to believe me that if I were sure that this plan can be carried out I would take up this matter.

But since there is very little probability to carry it out I prefer not to make any promises to you on this subject.

As to your invitation extended to Mrs. Gromyko and myself, to come up and to lunch with you at Hyde Park, Mrs. Gromyko and I are grateful to you for it. It would be a great pleasure for both of us to have a lunch with you and to visit that famous place again. But what prevents us from accepting your invitation is that it is not possible to know in advance the time when the Security Council will meet.

At each of its meetings the Security Council decides when it is going to meet again. Although I doubt that the Security Council will meet on Saturday, May 4th, however, I cannot be sure of that. Thus Mrs. Gromyko and myself naturally do not wish to cause you any inconvenience, in case our plan to go to Hyde Park is broken.

Once again we express our warm thanks to you for your kind invitation, and hope that we shall have chance to meet with you not in distant future.
