Dear Mrs. Roosevelt,

Ever since your visit to the East Side Job Council, back in June of 1940, I have looked upon you as a friend. It was, also, the feeling of several hundred assembled young job hunters, who reciprocated your warmth and sincere feelings for their welfare. I know it is the memory of that occasion, and your friendliness, that permits me to write you.

You may recall the letter of recommendation you sent me while serving in the Army, which was of considerable help in securing a direct commission. I was and am very grateful to you for that.

In April, I was released from the Army and, after a short rest, resumed my civilian career in the field of vocational adjustment by accepting an appointment on the central office staff of the Veterans Administration.

However, my deeper interest and wish is to find employment with the Secretariat of the United Nations Economic and Social Council. In view of your Chairmanship of the Sub-committee on Human Rights, I was hopeful that it might be possible for you to give me a letter of introduction to the appropriate officials.

In order that you may see at a glance some of my qualifications, I have prepared an Occupational Summary. It seems to me that I may fit into a number of the Council's activities—employment, vocational and rehabilitation problems.

I will be grateful to you for any aid or suggestions that you may have.

1943-Induction. N.Y. State Department of Education Supervisor of Vocational Rehabilitation. Responsible utilizing counseling, testing, medical, training, case work and placement techniques in planning program of vocational rehabilitation of physically and emotionally handicapped.

1941-43. "Y" Director of Guidance for community program of individual and group guidance. Staff consisted of 19 club counselors, 2 psychologists, 1 assistant and 1 case worker. Services included educational and vocational counseling, psychological testing, social case work, placement, group occupational information and referrals.

1938-41. Executive Director of community vocational guidance and employment service under auspices of social agencies council and supported by Greater New York Fund.

1936-38. Board of Education youth services program. Educational and vocational counselor of unemployed youth and teacher of courses in current events, social problems.
