Dear Mr. Acheson:

Mrs. David Levy, who was Adele Rosenwald, is extremely anxious to go for The Joint Distribution Committee, to Europe to see at first hand the conditions of Jewish people, and return in order to help in their fund raising campaign.

It will be an extremely valuable service if she can go because we are going to need all of the private aid possible if there is not to be death and pestilence rampant throughout Europe this winter. The Jewish people are the hardest hit of them all.

Mrs. Levy has tried to get the assurance of a priority on her return trip, and so far has been unsuccessful.

if you think it as important as I do, could you talk to the War Department and arrange it? She would have to go soon in order to be able to see what she must see and get back by the time the fund raising campaign starts in early February.

Dear Mrs Roosevelt:

I refer to your letter of November 15, requesting that the theater commander concerned be asked to aid the travel of Dr and Mrs Levy to France, Holland, Poland and Palestine.

In accordance with our demobilization program, the Army has been rapidly closing out of France and Holland. It has relinquished control to the countries concerned of requisitioned facilities, whose retention is not necessary for the accomplishment of our occupation mission in Germany; consequently, civilians traveling in these areas must necessarily make their own arrangements for travel, since the Army has neither personnel nor facilities to offer.

Concerning travel in Palestine and Poland, the Army has no facilities in these areas and all arrangements for travel must be completed by Dr and Mrs Levy.

However, if Dr and Mrs Levy intend to visit or transit the American occupied zone in Germany, arrangements have been completed with the State Department wherein all civilians, whose travel is approved by the State Department, will be assured of Army assistance.

I regret that the reduction of operations and facilities precludes any assistance by the Army other than in the American occupied zone in Germany.
