
My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:


Dear Mrs. Lindsey:

Your letter of 27 October 1945, concerning your son, Norman L. Lindsey, 35398844, Delta Disciplinary Training Center, APO 772, c/o Postmaster, New York, New York, has been forwarded to this headquarters for reply.

Norman L. Lindsey was confined at the Delta Disciplinary Training Center on 5 October 1945, per General Court-Martial Orders Number 88, Headquarters, Ninth Infantry Division. He was sentenced to be dishonorably discharged from the service, to forfeit all pay and allowances due or to become due, and to be confined for life. The place of confinement is designated as the United States Penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pennsylvania.

Evacuation of Norman L. Lindsey to the United States Penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, will take place as soon as shipping space is allotted.
