My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

Since my conversations with you in New York on the first of March, my work for the Chinese government has put me in touch with Dr. Raymond L. Zwemer, Executive Director of the Inter-Departmental Committee for Cultural and Scientific Development, an agency of the State Department. While I made no mention of the United Nations Fair, I sense that there is a natural corollary between the aims of his group and what is proposed by the Fair. It has occurred to me, therefore, if you have not already talked with Mr. Byrnes, that in so doing, it might be wise to bring in Dr. Zwemer as one of the parties at interest within the State Department.

John Cowden, a brilliant young writer for the Columbia Broadcasting System, and who worked with me on the original presentation to you of a year ago, is now in New York. I would like very much to bring him to see you, at your convenience, in anticipation of a revision of the existing presentation or the preparation of a new memorandum for those persons with in the Government to whose attention you think it should be brought. A note to me at this address, or a call to the Lashes, will bring us to your office.
