Dear Mrs. Roosevelt,

The Assistant Secretary-General for Public Information, Mr. Benjamin Cohen, had planned to write to you about the matters dealt with below, but having been obliged to leave New York abruptly in order to go to Europe, he has asked me to write to you on his behalf.

The Department of Public Information has had overwhelming evidence of the interest of American students and youth in the aims and ideals of the United Nations and wants to do everything possible to maintain and stimulate this interest. One of the things planned by the Department is to give a group of editors of high school papers an opportunity to meet and put questions to some of the most eminent United Nations personalities.

I therefore take the liberty to ask you to be the first to give these young people this great experience. No one could, better than you, make them understand the importance and urgency of the task of the United Nations and give them a sense of their own participation and responsibility. The plan is to have three personalities who could say a few words to the youngsters. Then there would be a short period during which they would put questions to the speakers.

We had originally hoped to get this group together early in June but, as the school year is drawing very near to its close, it is felt that a conference of this type will be more effective if it is convened in September when the new term begins.
