My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

Before expressing my gratitude to you for your kindness and intervention in our behalf, may I first tell you that you and the President are constantly in our thoughts and hearts, during this difficult period of our national life. Having a French husband, who was in France during all her darkest days, I have the sad privilege of knowing what a tragically heavy burden you are both carrying. How skillfully and with what wisdom and understanding the President has directed and guided the destinies of our nation! May you both have health and strength to lead us through the infinitely darker days which lie ahead.

It was so good of you to add to your overcharged schedule the "one more activity" brought to your attention by our mutual friend, Helene Crooks. Your interest made it possible for us to have precise and accurate information about our son, Rene', up to the time he was sent back to Occupied France, a "prisonnier en conge' de captivite'", the real meaning of which I presume only the Germans know. Now, of course, we are completely cut off from him, and we must wait, as thousands are waiting, for the day of Victory. May it come soon.

Please accept the very deep gratitude of my husband and myself for your great kindness and interest in our personal problem.

My dear Mrs. Morise:

Mrs. Roosevelt has sent us a copy of your letter of January 5th and expressed the hope that the American Red Cross might be able to secure information concerning your son, Rene'. I understand from your letter that you have no information concerning him since the time he was sent back to Occupied France as a "prisonnier en congé de captivité".

Although we do not have definite information, it is believed that a number of French prisoners have been released from recognized prison camps to take up civilian work in Occupied France, if they are especially skilled in the performance of certain tasks. They are required to report on their location and activities at regular intervals but, in all other respects, they resume civilian status. They are frequently described by the French phrase given above.

On orders received from a number of individuals in this country, we have sent standard American Red Cross food parcels to a prisoner known as Rene' Morise, Prisoner of War No. 3438, at Stalag IV B. You will know from the above identification whether or not this man is your son and, if so, you were apparently able to correspond with him up until the time he was released from the camp.

I am not sure from your letter whether or not you have any indication as to his location in Occupied France, if not, we could attempt to secure such information for you through an inquiry submitted by us to the International Red Cross Committee at Geneva. This inquiry could be made by cable, if you so desire.

If, as you indicate, he is no longer in a recognized prisoner of war camp, then the suspension of normal postal facilities between this country and enemy-occupied countries would prevent you from having direct communication with him. However, the American Red Cross has been authorized by the governments involved to serve, in co-operation with the International Red Cross Committee, as the channel through which messages can be sent by persons in this country to civilians in enemy dominated territory. Not all of the details of this service have as yet been worked out with the censorship officials of our government but, as soon as they are completed, all of our Chapters will have the necessary forms and instructions and you could therefore communicate with your son in this way.

My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

I have delayed answering your letter of January 21st with reference to the letter which you have had from Mr. Henry P. Van Dusen of the Union Theological Seminary, since it arrived just at the time when we were examining our whole policy with reference to distribution of food and clothing supplies to civilians in countries occupied by Germany.

The policy of the American Red Cross which was established at the outbreak of the war in Europe, has been that the American Red Cross would only distribute food and clothing supplies in European countries when permission could be secured from the Government authorities or the occupying authorities which would assure us the freedom of action in our relief planning and sufficient supervision by an American staff to guarantee a proper distribution.

We did make an arrangement with the German authorities providing for distribution of certain limited quantities of supplies in that part of Poland occupied by Germany. We had hoped that if these agreements proved satisfactory that we would be able to considerably broaden our distribution of relief supplies to include other people in Europe. This experience which we had in Poland did not prove satisfactory in that our planning was greatly restricted, our staff who were charged with the supervision were not allowed to travel on all occasions when it seemed necessary to do so, and communications between our staff and Washington Headquarters almost completely broke down because of the failure of the German authorities to grant us exceptional privileges in the matter of communications.

Again we tried making a plan in occupied France and again we found our actions greatly restricted and communications between our workers in the field and National Headquarters impossible.

Now that the United States has become a belligerent, we have been unable to find any plan for the distribution of supplies



which would guarantee that the relief given would not be to the advantage of the enemy. It seems highly improbable that the American Red Cross will be distributing supplies of food and clothing in occupied territories in the near future.

In the matter of medical and hospital relief, we have made some supplies available to go into the occupied countries to relieve certain urgent needs.

Should the existing situation change to such an extent that our Government decided American supplies might be distributed safely in countries occupied by the enemy and should some formula be found to prevent relief supplies which might be sent into occupied countries from going in just to replace things that Germany takes out or uses for its own purposes, then we would attempt to work out plans with the occupying authorities which would give us the freedom of action in our planning and the safeguards in our distributions which the established policies and practices of the American Red Cross require.

Hundreds of wives of soldiers and sailors, who are making only \$21. per month, are getting pregnant these days. Having no money and not being able to work during pregnancy, an appalling number of them are doing all sorts of things to get rid of the babies. My sister, a Presbyterian Hospital graduate nurse, now in charge of a part of the Danbury hospital, tells me that young wives are doing this in wholesale lots, thus getting rid of the cream of the next generation.

Can't something be done to aid these young mothers-to-be, to make them feel that in bearing children (many of whom may never see their fathers) they, too, are performing a noble service for their country? Money is allocated for all sorts of things these days. Certainly, seeing that these young mothers-to-be have adequate care - not charity care, either - is a vital necessity, if we are to survive as a nation.

Recently a defense manufacturer offered a prize of \$1,000. to the first man in his factory to become the father of twins. That mother has a husband who is earning good money, who can be with her, and they received \$1,000. in addition.

My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

I have delayed, on account of absence, an answer to your letter of April 1st, with an enclosure, regarding the prenatal care of wives of men in the armed forces.

The primary responsibility of Red Cross Home Service is to assist service and ex-service men and their families in meeting those needs which arise from the man's service in the armed forces. Because of low pay, or his absence from home, a man's service may make it difficult for him to provide the prenatal and maternity care his wife requires. The home Chapter of the family stands ready, therefore, to assist in such situations.

Where numbers of families are congregated in camp communities, special service is set up from time to time, where the size of the nursing or hospital care problem calls for it. In individual cases the attention of the Red Cross Chapter should be called to the need.

Mrs. Hammond, a newspaper woman who recently returned from England, brought me the story of Mrs. Stafford Lewis, who has been using her place as a rest place for aviators in their free time, and as a convalescent home. She has been using her own money and is now running out of funds.

The British Army and Navy are willing to take it over and that would mean it was available only to British men. She takes all nationalities and does not want to make it exclusively for the British.

Would it be possible for the Red Cross to take it over for all nationalities and pay at least, a good part of the running expenses? I am enclosing the names of her committee.

In connection with the suggestion contained in your letter of August 17th, I have made inquiry regarding the canteen situation at the Washington Union Station. The United Services Organization, under a national agreement with the Red Cross, has the responsibility of conducting canteens for the use of service men who are coming and going through the railroad stations, bus terminals, et cetera. At that time we cleared the request through our London Office in accordance with our understanding with the British Red Cross and the Authorities of the British Government that all requests for assistance from the British Empire or other areas under British Military Control are to be cleared through London. In reply we were advised by our representative in London that the matter had been taken up with the British Red Cross who in turn were clearing it with their representatives in India. Subsequently, we were advised to take no further action in regard to the request.

We are now, however, cabling our London Office that a similar request has been received by you from Lady Linlithgow and referred to the American Red Cross. We are asking that they again take the matter up with the British Authorities and advise us as to their present position in regard to this inquiry. Any action that we may take will, of course, be based upon this reply, and I will advise you as soon as further information is available.

Dear Mr. Davis:

The United States Committee for the Care of European Children is confronted with a problem. A thousand children may be evacuated from France and we have to raise between \$900,000 and \$1,000,000. The Joint Distribution Committee will give up to \$400,000 to \$450,000 and out of that they will charter a Portuguese ship to bring these children over.

The United States Committee will therefore have to raise about \$500,000. We think we can do it, but as it is an immediate necessity and must be decided as soon as possible, we wonder if the Red Cross would be willing to underwrite that amount. We would then go out and try to raise the money..

You will probably never be called upon to make good any of this money, but Mr. Marshall Field feels the committee can not obligate itself without having the sum underwritten.

It does seem that we should take these children who are in such dire straits and I hope that the Red Cross will feel that they can do this. I shall be grateful if you will wire me at the White House what your feeling is on this.

My dear Miss Thompson:

Your request of September 1 to Chairman Davis for information regarding schools of nursing in Chicago and the Middle West, which charge only minimum or no tuition, has been referred to this office for reply.

I believe my secretary has talked with you about this request so that we could be in a better position to supply you with the information which would be of greatest help to you. I have requested the National League of Nursing Education to send you a copy of the schools of nursing meeting minimum requirements, as set by law, for all the States in the Union. Although this book will give you much more information than you have requested, it will be possible for you to obtain from it an idea at least of what schools charge tuition and which ones do not. There is no indication as to the size of the tuition in any instance and this information could have to be obtained from each individual school. I might state, however, that tuitions in most of the schools of nursing throughout the country are very small as compared to tuitions in other educational institutions. As the calibre of the school varies greatly regardless of whether or not they charge tuition, and the size of the hospital, I am sending you under separate cover a list of the schools which are included in the booklet which will be sent you from the League which meet Red Cross requirements.

I do not know exactly how Mrs. Roosevelt anticipates using this information but if she is referring prospective student nurses to any particular school, I think it would be well if she could select schools which appear on the list meeting Red Cross requirements. Unfortunately, there is still a considerable number of schools in the country which do not provide adequate preparation for their students. It would be rather embarrassing for Mrs. Roosevelt, therefore, if she were to refer a prospective student to such a school, only to have the student find, upon graduation, that she was not eligible for service with the armed forces.

No news at all from her since 22 December last year, but from my Husband's Rubber Managers & Office Staff, who escaped from Java to Australia, we hear she was expecting a baby early in August, that she was working as a Voluntary Nurse (March of this year) at Djember, &

that her Husband Noel Arthur Pope, had  
joined the Dutch Forces & was probably  
fighting in the Hills with the Guerrillas. Their  
Votah was Toegoesari, near Djember, (20 miles)  
situated about under the O ~~islands~~ showers  
in Soerabaya in most maps of Java.

They were all very busy harvesting & John hoped they (the Regiment) would be able to help the next day. The previous night he had been with your Quartermaster Corps, & had had a grand evening.

If you have any lonely Boys in our vicinity, do ask them to look us up. We shall be so pleased to do anything we can under the patrol restrictions. We have had some of your Air Force over, & they were interested in our little Church, & the carving at the Hall. Of course the "Gardens" are no more

Watercress has increased to  $7\frac{1}{2}$  Acres. Last  
year we sent off over 46,000 barrels, & hope to  
do even better this year. It is a useful winter

My dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

With further reference to the appeal from Lady Linlithgow in India for skilled orthopaedic nurses and necessary equipment, which was the subject of my letter to you dated August 27, 1942, we have recently received a reply from our London Headquarters to our cabled request that this matter be again cleared with the British Red Cross.

The British Red Cross advises that Lady Linlithgow is President of the India Red Cross which is completely independent of the British Red Cross, and that the specific request is on behalf of the India Red Cross. Further, the British Red Cross during the past year has made a substantial cash grant to the India Red Cross for general purposes, but they do not feel that Lady Linlithgow's request is either within the scope of their present activities or resources.

Likewise, in view of the acute shortage of specialists in this country, I do not feel that the American Red Cross should undertake to fulfill Lady Linlithgow's request without further evidence of the urgency of the need for such personnel. To this end, I am having the matter referred to one of our staff members who is leaving in the near future for India, with instructions to explore the need carefully and to report his findings as promptly as possible.

As soon as we have this additional information I will write you as to our decision in this matter.

It was very kind of you to have your secretary answer my letter to you of Sept 9th, 1942. However she has been ill to answer until today - will try to do so at this time -

My son - Staff Sergeant Virgil Edwin Inge - joined the army - Oct 20-1937 - Reenlisted - Oct 20th 1940 - His serial number was 6570535 - His last address was - Medical Dept - Station Hospital - Fort Wm McKinley - Philippine Islands - a cablegram however - was my last message received from him - on March 28-1942.

The War Dept wrote me on May 20-1942 - he is missing in action - I pray and thank God - if he is - rather than be a prisoner of the Japanese or hopelessly crippled for life - There are worse things than death -

But I wish so much - I could learn name and address of some soldier or nurse who escaped from the Islands - who had been in Medical Dept at Fort McKinley or Batasan - just for chance they might have known him -

Should he - return - after the war - safe and well - there is no way to express in mere words what it would mean to me - You are a mother - you know - But in the meantime - I try to believe the War Dept is right about him - A second letter states he still is not listed as a prisoner. My heart aches so - for all the other mothers - in these trying times -

To me - I find comfort in believing Virgil is free of suffering and torture - is resting - and with God - and some day - we will be together again. I pray for strength and courage to carry on - and never to do or say anything to cause anyone - to have less faith in God - for knowing me -

God has been more than good to me - He gave me my darling son for 26 years - He gave me 26 March 3-1942; and my darling husband - who has never known a moment - free of pain

since the 1st W. W. Yet he never complains - Everything  
good and fine that a woman can want to find in a  
man - I've found in my husband. We haven't much in  
a material way - but to me - my life is precious - price-  
less - I have had - I still have - blessing of which no  
woman ever had or can have - My Virgil loved and  
respected my darling husband - called him dad - he  
was so grand to me and I miss him - terribly - but

I'm too ill to write this as I wish - I hope you will over look my mistakes - It is so sweet of you - to be so kind to so many - you have your own problems and headaches - Oh I pray your loved ones - will be returned safely to you - Pray God will guide and grant true courage and strength and a depth of faith - to carry you and our good President - thru these trying days - until Peace and Victory is with us - and - to all - dear to you both!

Dear Mrs. Roosevelt

First let us get re-aquainted. I was a former friend of Gus. Generich and on November 3rd. 1932 was the promoter of a gigantic motorcycle pilgrimage that terminated on your front lawn at Hyde Park, N. Y.

The reason I am writing to you is because I remember the true democratic way you moved about the riders assembled on your lawn while your honorable husband and his great mother sat in the open car and received the small token of admiration from one of our girl riders, then told us a pleasant yarn about his only ride on a motorcycle.

I am a great admirer and booster of your honorable husband who remarked to me if ever I can help you don't fail to call on me. Realizing how busy the President must be at present I am calling on you for this help.

For a number of years I have been keeping company with a swell real American Sweetheart, a graduate nurse. We were to be married when along came the war and being 100% Americans we both decided to put our shoulders to the wheel. I personally would have had no greater pleasure than to be in a uniform however due to a slight physical defect I could not qualify except by appointment. Not being politically connected I guess that's out however I have stepped back into one of the wars most essential trades, tool and gage making. At present I am a gage expert for the United Aircraft Corp. Motors Division but this is all besides the point. My Sweetheart joined the U.S. Army Nurses Corps on July 15th. at Fort Totten, L. I. The elaborate promises helped a lot to quicken her decision, however what a tariffic let down once she was sworn in. Now hear is where I ask your help. I truthfully believe if you would look into these white sisters complaints it would be more than appreciated by the only women that are with our fighting boys all the way to the front lines. The WAAC'S and WAVE'S were organized practically over night, The Nurses noticed this fact and also noticed that they were immediately equipped with all kinds of uniforms and equipment, Ranks and publicity, while the nurses are still buying there own equipment the Army being short.

My Sweetheart Lt. Helen Cornwell was inducted at Fort Totten and after six weeks was transferred to Camp Butner, N. C. She drove her own car from Long Island to North Carolina taking another nurse with her. On her arrival in this newly started Camp she was in a room at the nurses quarters with nothing but a cot having to live out of a suit case.

In trying to collect the milage transportation she was rightfully entitled to she was allowed 450 miles instead the 600 miles it actually is. In registering her complaint to the officer in charge she was politely told she can protest his desision but try and collect. Last week she requested to leave a duplicate key to her car with the Colonel in case the army might need her car. The food I am given to understand in terrible the supervision still worse, and more work than can be properly handled by one girl still more their liberties are cut to a minimum. Lt. Cornwell is still a sport and wants to do her part however it seems very unfair to any of these girls to have to be slighted and neglected and abused as they are.

Now my plea to you is pay one of the New Camps a surprise visit, speak to the girls see what equipment they have received and what is done for their comfort, I have seen and think it is most disgraceful and discouraging to any of them. The Army needs more nurses and the reference they receive from those already in certainly can be no inducement.

Lt. Helen Cornwell knows nothing of this letter to you however I trust you will give it any consideration you possibly can. With kindest regards to the Honorable President and yourself I beg to remain,

This has reference to your letter of October 15th, directed to the Honorable Norman H. Davis, wherein you ask for a welfare report concerning Staff Sergeant Virgil Edwin Maye. Your letter was directed to this Department in order that complete information might be secured for you.

This, of course, takes a little while and we have just now received a report which confirms the information you have given in your letter, that the official records indicate Sergeant Maye is reported missing in the Philippine Islands. The next of kin is listed as Mrs. Roy E. Larson, P. O. Box 91, Galimesa, California. She received official notification to this effect from the War Department. We, likewise, communicated with our Red Cross Chapter covering Galimesa in order that she might be given any necessary assistance.

As you know, we have not yet received complete prisoner of war lists from the Philippine Islands, so that Staff Sergeant Maye will be considered missing in action until such lists are received from the Japanese Government through the International Red Cross Committee. When such lists are received we shall be very glad to clear Sergeant Maye's name and advise you accordingly.

The mother may wish to take advantage of the opportunity the Red Cross is providing in an attempt to forward messages to those men listed as missing in the Philippines. The Red Cross will give no assurance of delivery, but these messages will be forwarded on exchange ships with Japan and as facilities are available will be sent to the Delegate of the International Red Cross Committee in Japan, who will make every effort to see that they are delivered.


The letter which you forwarded to Mr. Norman Davis concerning the conditions at Camp Butner, has been referred to this office. We regret exceedingly that such adverse reports are made of Army Camps, since every effort is made to organize the nursing service in every respect with the minimum of inconvenience to all concerned. However, we know the difficulty of effecting a smooth running organization in these newly established posts, where frequently patients have to be taken care of in advance of the receipt of the necessary equipment and supplies. Many nurses in the various military hospitals have found it a challenge and a stimulus to improvise and give good nursing care under adverse conditions, and generally they have done a surprisingly good job, with the facilities at hand, for caring for the sick.

The morale of the nurses has been splendid throughout, since they know full well that adequate supplies and equipment will be provided with the least practicable delay.

Every effort is being made through legislation to equalize the pay and allowances for nurses with that of the WAVES and WAACS. In the meantime, existing regulations govern the allowances for travel by Army Nurses on transfer from station to station.

A copy of the letter in reference has been forwarded to the Commanding General, Fourth Service Command, for investigation and necessary action.

Dear Miss Thompson,

Thank you so much for writing me. I am more grateful than I can say that Mrs. Roosevelt is taking the trouble to speak to the Chairman of the American Red Cross about me. It is only because I am so eager to be of greater service that I presumed to bother her.

Knowing how rarely it works for a man to push himself into a situation where he's not wanted, and even less so for a woman, I was eager to avoid any pressure on government agencies to which I had applied. They are probably swamped with applications, and it was because I had figuratively speaking turned my back on them that I looked to Mrs. Roosevelt, since she would be likely to know of possibilities I had not explored. Had I written later, I would have asked about opportunities in the new Office of Foreign Relief and Rehabilitation or the Office of Foreign Territories. Should the Chairman of the American Red Cross then not need any one like me in the near future, do you suppose I could be useful in either of those Offices? In case the information might prove helpful, I attach a statement of my experience.

Here in St. Louis through the coming week, I expect to return to Washington on the 16th of December, where I can be reached in care of Miss Mary La Dame, Assistant to the Secretary, U.S. Department of Labor.

Sept. 1940-Sept. 1941 in New York vainly seeking job related to world emergency.

June 1939-Sept. 1940 in Europe, most of time in Paris where for six weeks after arrival of Germans I watched their below-the-surface procedures. Had been studying at University, living with international family, French and British, in wholly French community. Did free lance articles for Education page, New York Sunday Times, for Christian Science Monitor, for Independent Woman and Forecast Magazines. In England at beginning of trip. Abroad and in Canada many people welcomed me into their homes.

1926-1939 in public relations work, including:

1937-1939, Publicity and press relations director, Radcliffe College, Cambridge, Mass., where I had to win over an antagonistic press; 6 years in child health and welfare field, including much ghost writing for White House Conference on Child Health and Protection, translating reports of experts into simple language for the layman; 4 years in money raising, during first three of which I got training under newspaper men at Tamlyn & Brown's- news and feature articles, news photos, radio talks, printed leaflets and booklets, facts for editors, in local and nation-wide campaigns.

1916-1926 in personnel and executive work, retail stores and factories:

2 years as manager of manufacturing and alterations at Lord & Taylor's; 8 years in clothing factories; wide acquaintance with many nationalities, including Bohemian, Italian, Hungarian, Jewish, French and British, often explaining the point of view of one group to another; managed clothing factory dealing with Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America.

1913-1916, investigating for Women's Municipal League of Boston.

Radcliffe College, A.B. cum laude, 1913; English, Economics and French courses especially. Favorite professors, William A. Neilson and Edwin F. Gay. Latter aroused my interest in China. Graduate courses in advertising, art and music appreciation, and Far Eastern studies.

Born in Boston, Mass. of naturalized Viennese, Catholic father who had lived in Paris, and of British-Canadian mother, Protestant. Both deceased. Naturally as a child I learned to think of people not in terms of where they were born, but in terms of character, ability and background. Education and experience developed this attitude further so that comments by one nationality about another, which some people take as insults or flattery are neither to me, but simply mistaken impressions to be corrected in a friendly exchange of information. Closest friends are Early American, British, French, Chinese, Russian and Iranian. My whole life has been preparation for a job connected with building understanding and cooperation between people of different nationalities.
