Following is counterintelligence summary number 11
for week ending 29 December 1944.

Further evidence this week that all-out espionage
and sabotage drive was planned mid November onwards by
German intelligence services to support present offensive.
Abwehr KDO'S and Trupps were given task infiltrate agents
by line crossing and parachute behind our lines. Stiffening
of Abwehr discipline for these operations ordered and
direction more energetic. Agents employed mostly members
pro German fascist parties, earlier escaped to Germany, now
being recruited and trained in large numbers by German

intelligence service. Continuance strong parachutist and line crossing offensive against France and Luxemburg anticipated. Augmenting this Abwehr effort Skorxeny began early October to recruit and train "harassing units" presently in action on battle front (vide sabotage section below).

Counterintelligence measures against these extended efforts to some extent hampered by rumours and false reports. German radio propoganda striving create nervousness among civilians in liberated territories may have had some effect and possible certain recurring rumours originate from enemy sources.

Survey of position France where principal efforts made gives some idea of actual scale:

Since mid December 21 parachute agents arrested and estimated further 11 believed at large. Majority of these are saboteurs with fuel sabotage missions.

Above situation need not cause undue alarm as clues exist to aid search for missing agents and French authorities now beginning operate extensive countermeasures (vide section on France below). To date no major act of sabotage reported France.

Espionage.

A. Parachute agent dropped near Chartres had mission to contact enemy agent in Paris with questionnaire and funds. Further courier agent arrived same means near Perpignan.

B. Important arrest Strasbourg of former member of Abwehrstelle Dijon likely to produce valuable aid in mopping up operations French interior.

C. Agent arrested Seventh Army area had mission to establish intelligence organization Paris to find his own WT operators and to arrange reception facilities for parachute agents area Evreux.

D. Names and descriptions secured of 32 persons formerly employed factories Lyons area now being trained for line crossing and parachute operations France. Details separately distributed.

E. Further areas for possible future parachute operations, Rheims, Besancon, Bordeaux, Dijon.

Sabotage.

A. 150th Panzer Brigade, with estimated 1,000 to 2,500 personnel in American uniforms and 300 American vehicles including tanks, has been engaging in "harassing" tactics in support of German offensive.

Under command this brigade is "Einheit Stielau" with estimated 120 to 150 English speaking Germans. Personnel this unit appear to have been recruited by Skorxeny in October at Friedenthal and subsequently trained Grafenwohr, with rest of 150th Panzer Brigade. Men were formed into engineer groups, (presumably for demolition work), communication destroyer groups (road, rail and bridge obstruction) and radio groups (tactical reconnaissance work). Stielau unit used in small jeep parties, were probably intended for work at furthest distance from German lines, where their linguistic abilities and false identity papers might be expected to get them by. Principal sabotage objectives appear to have been Meuse bridges. So far at least 18 of Stielau unit captured and 12 killed.

B. Two saboteurs, (French Exmilicien) of party believed 11 in number, arrested Santamarin. Mission to destroy gasoline trucks both rail and road.

C. Eleven saboteurs arrested near Limoges with mission sabotage oil pipeline and with equipment similar to that possessed by saboteurs Blois (vide counterintelligence summary number 10, sabotage section).

D. Five further arrests of enemy agents associated with Hagedorn group of AMT 68 in Paris as a result of arrest reported last week (vide Para 1H).

E. Agent arrested Autsdorf while carrying out his mission of cutting telephone wires.

General security and political factors.

1. France.

A. Despite orders to this effect, now evident very few arms have been surrendered by members French resistance groups.

B. DGER planning network of observation posts, control posts and mobile squads designed to counter enemy's increasing efforts to drop parachute agents France. Information concerning terrain most favourable for such operations being supplied from British special operations sources. Ministry of interior is reconstituting former service D'Atterrissage et Parachutage and embodying its personnel with Defense Passive. Ministry for air is reconstituting the observation posts of the forces Aeriennes de L'Interieur and linking them by telephone. Surveillance du Territoire (ST) will have control of whole observation system and from central point alert squads of police, FFI, gardes mobiles, gendarmerie or troops to operate where necessary. DSDOC will continue to collate all available intelligence on enemy parachute operations and give intelligence and technical directives to ST. Allied counter-intelligence staffs requested to support these comprehensive measures.

C. Three members of FrancoBelgian arms smuggling gang mentioned in summary number 8 arrested. Investigation in progress.

D. Captured letter from Jacques Doriot gives plans of PFF. Headquarters are at Neustadt, and party secretary Beaux directs all work in Germany. Future action has been planned in conjunction with Ribbentrop, Himmler, Goebbels and the Fuehrer himself. They comprise propaganda for French workers and French prisoners in Germany, for a party newspaper and an already established radio station. Main action is to be directed toward France with object sustaining many party comrades left behind.

SHAEF comment on above:

1. Letter refers to political and propaganda aspects only. Ample evidence exists to show close connection between PFF and German intelligence service and much use has already been made of its members for secret service work.

2. Luxemburg one tenth of civilian population evacuated from forward battle areas but government showing capacity to handle this situation. Resistance groups not yet disarmed are small and generally promote order and cooperate with government. Epuration has produced estimated 4,500 suspected collaborationists but cases now under review and releases being made. With food situation almost normal and prices

moderate, little likelihood of civil disturbances or
organized opposition to government.

3. Belgium as with French opposition parties,
German propaganda and intelligence services are attempting
to exploit Rexist refugees in Germany and those of Flemish
and Walloon nationalist groups. Members of these groups
have been captured on line crossing missions and efforts
likely to be made to secure action by members still in
Belgium. From general Belgian political point of view danger
of this not considered great.

Counter intelligence summary number eight for week ending 8th December 1944. A survey of Abwehr order of battle has been carried out and in broad outline is set out below. This should be of interest as indicating origin of line crossers and assist tactical interrogations.

Abwehr Kommandos (KDO's) and Trupps formerly operating in France and the Low Countries are known to have moved back on to the German frontier and to have roughly the following operational areas.

A. Holland, Belgium and north France.

1. Military espionage: KDO 130 located west of Dusseldorf with an agents camp at Meschede and four Trupps in the area north east and north west of Cologne with a training school at Densborn.

2. Sabotage: KDO 213, located Muenster area with Trupps now believed on Belgian and Dutch borders, with a training school at Doorn.

3. Counter espionage: KDO 307, located formerly in Brussels with four Trupps now presumably in Holland and on Belgian border areas.

4. Naval: A Marine KDO operating in Holland.

B. North east France area.

1. Military espionage: KDO 120, Mannheim area, formerly Nussdorf, with an agents camp at Hubacker with three Trupps respectively in Kirn area, Lutterbach and Hundsbach. One Trupp prepares parachute missions which start from the Aschaffenburg airport.

2. Sabotage: KDO 210, located Moselle area with three Trupps last heard of in the Muenster, Metz and Belfort areas.

3. Counter espionage: KDO Enschede area believed to consist of about a dozen Trupps formerly spread throughout France, some of which are presumably operating against this area.

C. France and Low Countries generally. KDO 128 Luft, located Koblenz area, with one Trupp in Mannheim area, and another with two units located near Hofheim and near Dueren respectively.

1. Espionage.

A. More notable successes against German intelligence services in France. Arrests reported as follows: two agents at Le Havre, two at Metz and one each at Cherbourg, Rouen, Monte Carlo, Paris, Lille, Beziers, Berdorf, St Die, Nancy, Clermont Ferrand.

B. D/F units have secured first success. German WT agent who had been operating several months located in small village Pas de Calais area. House to house search by French TR officers, following D/F leads ended in agents arrest.

C. Counter intelligence summary 7, espionage section, IB reported start made in uncovering Schuchmanns Naval Espionage network channel coast. Le Havre captures mentioned above are continuation this work. Further agent arrested Rouen is Abwehr paymaster in possession 100,000 francs and may also be connected.

D. Colonel Walter Buchwald, Chief of the Abwehr Station at Strasbourg and official of the Abwehr since 1929 discovered in prisoner of war screening camp. Likely to provide important information.

E. French Air Force Pilot, recruiter of French Air Force personnel for German Intelligence services for use as agents in North Africa and elsewhere, arrested.

F. Of 102 agents captured to date in 21st Army Group area, 72 are Abwehr, 25 SD and five various.

G. In Belgium woman arrested as collaborator now identified as Staybehind WT agent.

2. Sabotage.

A. German agent arrested Metz had mission of reporting upon effect of 30 delayed action bombs placed by enemy before retreat. From agents testimony two bombs discovered. Bombs contained several hundred pounds high explosive, initiated by 21 day J-Feder 504 time clock. One in gasworks, the other in building considered likely to be occupied by Allied troops and in fact so occupied. Size of charges and use of J-Feder 504 suggests work of German demolition personnel but German Intelligence Services interest suggests this type of work now under their general direction. The 28 further bombs not yet recovered but a number of unexplained explosions reported in vicinity of St Avold and Metz.

B. Saboteur surrendered to 6th Army Group with 16 lumps explosive coal given him in June to plant in coal bunkers of locomotives when Allied Armies arrived in vicinity Mittelbron.

3. General security and political factors.

A. France.

1. Unconfirmed reports German escapers and invaders in hiding being fed by collaborators. Reports of suspicious

civilians moving over River Somme in south eastern direction may point to enemy prisoners of war escape route.

2. Report of arms smuggling across Franco Belgian frontier being investigated: arms reputed for Belgian civilians.

3. Germans showing special interest in Spanish Reds, Toulouse and their relations with Russia and effective part in maintenance relations with Russia.

B. Belgium.

1. Surete playing increasingly active and effective part in maintenance of security within country.

2. Communist press attempted foment trouble for government after recent disturbances, announcing a day of national mourning for non existent dead, but other newspapers published impartial accounts. Agitation was supported by only small minority and as yet no danger of major troubles. Disarming of resistance groups continuing.

3. Security arrangements at Antwerp progressing well and will include perimeter wiring, minefields, pass system, evacuation of civilian population inside dock area, reinforcements of CMP's for guarding vulnerable points. Five security sections in port.

C. Holland.

1. Dutch security service not yet started operate. All personnel and records now reached Brussels and preparing begin work Holland. Counter intelligence problem in Holland so far handled by Allied personnel operating from Tilburg.

2. Efforts concentrated tightening up all control of movement. Special military restricted zone established in Canadian Army area and identity cards within it to be validated, pass systems, roving patrols and control posts set up, forward areas evacuated of civilians. Resistance group cooperating excellently in this.

D. Germany.

1. Information well placed source supports general view on Nazi underground given last summary, I.E. resistance by party groups rather than peoples war. Groups may be constituted as Freischaren or units of Freikorps, under direction of SS whose headquarters for this work already established about June 1944 at SS Junkerschule, Bad Tolz. Training for security reasons moved to Sonthofen in the Allgau where 1500 men presently being trained.

2. Under direction of SD important resistance role envisaged for Hitler Jugend Bannstreufendienst (Hitler Jugend Patrol Service). Hitler Jugend members valuable for underground as containing most fanatical Nazi elements whose names least known to Allies.

3. Records bearing on all Nazi elements are to be transferred to hiding places as underground will continue its activities against these elements even after defeat.

4. Reliable Nazis posing as anti Nazis or deserters posted abroad to support this work. Foreign currency to be procured to finance activities.

B. Enemy sabotage actions to be concentrated on ports, lines of communication and fuel. Contact to be made with and support given to subversive elements behind Allied lines.

1. Espionage. Important successes mopping up operations France reported this week:

A. Counter intelligence summary number 5, Espionage Section item 1, predicted round up in Le Havre area of important network. This is now proceeding satisfactorily with arrest of two most active WT agents and other arrests imminent.

B. In Normandy an agent formerly run by Schuchmann's Naval espionage network arrested. This arrest should effectively aid breakup of Schuchmann's organization along the Channel coast.

C. SD agent arrested by FFI near Paris and found to have long history of penetrating resistance movements. Sent through lines to contact WT operator in Paris and report

on eight high German officers suspected of desertion. Alternative mission to attempt to lure Allied agents to Switzerland, by reporting bogus plot against Himmler.

D. Important WT operator arrested in Sets. He is Arab nationalist, who published newspaper in Vichy in 1943 and was installed by Germans in summer 1944 to report on Allied activities in south of France.

Future plans.

E. Attempt likely to made from Spanish station to contact by courier a number of Germans believed hiding in Paris.

F. Line crossing in 12th Army Group area continues from the controls of KDO 130 at Mulheim and I/C at Nussdorf. SD control point for same purposes at Deventer in Holland.

G. Abwehr agent captured by Seventh Army testifies that important agents now flown to Spain by Lufthansa, to be pushed across Pyrenean frontier into France. Junkers also used for similar missions on flighter Berlin Barcelona.

A. Correlated information from captured saboteurs, emphasises impressive scale of Skorzeny's plan for sabotage and subversion. He now disposes pooled resources of sabotage commandos formerly run by Section 2 of Abwehr and has created certain new units apparently for para military use. These are in addition to German manned Jaeger battalion 502 and the possibility of recruiting Volksdeutsche elements from Brandenburg Regiment and Lehr Regiment Kurfuerst.

Besides specific sabotage operations, Skorzeny is responsible for starting or encouraging subversive movements behind the Allied lines and this work is now considered vitally important. He is also to plan Maquis operations in Germany itself.

B. Counter intelligence summary number 5, sabotage Section item 3, reported existence of Jeanne organization in France. Leader of this now under arrest. FFI have many names of members and some already arrested. Jeanne danger now greatly reduced.

C. An important sabotage school and centre has been identified at Kasteel De Ruitertert near Doorn.

3. General security and political factors.

2. Equipment difficulties have slowed down
the formation of the first six security battalions.

3. Strong Allied support of Pierlot's efforts
to maintain order may temporarily stabilize the country but
gulf widening between strong militant elements and a govern-
ment regarded generally as weak and effete. There have been
demonstrations of protest, accompanied by firing and casualties,
dissatisfaction over disarming of resistance groups and partial
strikes of transport and Post Office employees; gendarmerie
at present able to maintain order and food situation continues
to improve.

C. Commandant Paillole, formerly director of Securite Militaire, promoted Lieutenant Colonel and given post in Gendarmerie Nationale.

2. Explosions at FFI Headquarters at Gimone and Manosquik have caused some apprehension.

3. By special act of amnesty, Marcel Thorex allowed to return to France from Russia. He was enthusiastically received by political sympathisers in Paris.

4. On initiative of Thillan, Minister for Air, all directors of Air France arrested, among them two Suez Canal directors; thought to be part of general drive against "Les Trusts".

C. Luxembourg.

1. Resistance groups active in epuration arrests and also conducting illegal trials, latter being largely winked at by the Minister of Justice.

2. The Gendarmerie and state police appear to have adequate control of situation which is generally satisfactory.

Very slight possibility sabotage Suez Canal area by Japanese agents indicated by preliminary investigation through British Intelligence sources and USAFIME G-2. Suez Canal itself is regarded by British as practically immune from external damage such as dynamiting or mining. There are no locks or machinery to be damaged. British regard only possibility sinking of ship in canal which would not necessarily delay transit other ships. British Navy security on ships passing canal regarded as excellent. Sabotage in canal area itself not regarded as important because few facilities that could be damaged would not delay ships transit. German efforts line up disturbing elements Egypt and Palestine connection recent parachute landings being watched very carefully. Believed here Germans will experience little success with Arabs especially since Lord Moyne killing. Little efforts high level Axis espionage both countries minor selling information continues. Full report later when investigation completed.

Message 62205 re WAR msg 66946.

On 6 October five enemy agents parachuted into Palestine comprising three Palestinian Aryan Germans and two Arabs mission to foment racial political disturbances. They were briefed by Mufti in Berlin before leaving. Two of the Germans and one Arab now under arrest; one German named Deininger and one Arab named Abuali still at large. Under arrest in Beirut are three European and one Arab agent sent here late August by Arab Affairs Branch of German Sicher Heits Dienst with political subversive mission. Suspect one Iraqi agent from Rashid Ali Clan who passed through Rhodes May by now have been dropped in Iraq. There is independent report that Rashid Ali may be dropped into Iraq because believed he would prefer do this than remain in Germany. Mufti and Rashid Ali are hostile to each other hence do not believe they can be expected to indulge in joint activity. Reference security controls authorities state only practicable means entry Levant is by air usually via airdrome Crete otherwise agents would have to cross European battle front plus fact Turkey has severed Axis connections and now has efficient security control. A. Increased efforts by special Air and Naval Intelligence units likely to lead to dispatch through Allied lines of agents of higher grade than those used for tactical purposes in Normandy.

B. German Intelligence service in Barcelona and Madrid preparing lines from those centres into Allied controlled territory.

C. Attempts being made to increase espionage effort as far back as UK.

New Subject: Sabotage.

A. Following information derives from Allied agent who worked for German sabotage organization and is believed to be generally accurate. According to this agent's testimony, German sabotage plans are on larger scale than we had anticipated. Buried sabotage dumps have been widely distributed throughout the liberated territories. Thirteen have been discovered. These are not intended for immediate tactical use but for future use when enemy agents can return to them.

Dump position is as follows:

France. 800 dumps. Principal targets: railway tracks, electricity installations and port installations.


Holland and Denmark. 80 and 50 dumps respectively. No exact information on targets but believed to be same as those for France and Belgium.

B. Headquarters of the German counter sabotage organization in France have been captured intact in Paris. Includes an important museum containing French and British bombs, all types of radio equipment and Army. It also contained accurate data about the Allied sabotage attacks in France.

New subject: Political factors. Attention is drawn to the existence within the German sabotage organization of a special section for psychological warfare (Zersetzung Arbeit) in view of this fact, Counter Intelligence has to take note of political factors which besides being dangerous on their own account, may be made use of by the enemy. It is further significant that expert German Intelligence agents have recently been directed to obtain political intelligence and this appears to be an increasing interest. It is even evident that the enemy have not yet lost all hope of resurrecting elements of the Fascist 5th Column, EG. They have been making enquiries concerning the size of the PPF in France and popular reactions to the arrests of certain

A. France. The Government, aware of necessity of unifying resistance groups and creating one central authority, is taking steps to integrate all security intelligence bodies in France. Irregular Deuxieme Bureaux of FFI are to be brought within one central service. Security measures in France however continue to be handicapped by administrative confusion and lack of records. Germans removed all criminal records from the Surets and political records have also been dispersed.

Political tension continues to characterize position in Southwest France, where Communist FTP (estimated 25 percent of full strength of FFI) wield considerable influence in FFI: while strong group of Spanish maquis (estimate 20,000 armed for and experienced in Partisan war fare, constitutes a serious problem.

B. Belgium. Against general background of economic depression resistance groups present a special problem. By withholding recognition from some groups including Communist partisans, government has left them uncontrolled while itself failing to fulfill conditions under which resistance groups are prepared to accept its authority. These are energetic epuration, incorporation of FI into Army En Bloc and

implementation of the Arrete recognizing the groups by statute, establishing their rights, and providing for payment of active members. Position of epuration particularly unsatisfactory, as Surete and civil police inadequate in personnel and arms. Thus 12,000 dossiers of collaborators still await examination.

Unless Government recognizes necessity of solving these problems, there is danger of certain resistance groups taking the law into their own hands.

C. Holland. Position not yet properly tested. So far resistance groups have been cooperative but not so far unified as in France and Belgium. Dutch police have not played the important role of the police in France and Belgium in this connection.



Here follows report on incident in Rome 18th September and action taken.

1. The trial under epuration proceedings of Pietro Caruso former Fascist Chief of Police of Rome was scheduled to open in Rome on the morning of 18th Sept. Before the judges were seated and before Caruso had been brought into court elements of the public broke into the courtroom clamoring for the lynching of the defendant. These elements then attacked Donato Carretta former director of Regina Coeli prison who was present and was to have been called as a witness at the trial. Carjotta was dragged from the courtroom, beaten, thrown into the Tiber and finally beaten to death. His body was then taken by the crowd to the Regina Coeli prison and tied to a window grating. Military police of the Rome Allied Area Command cut down the body and dispersed the crowd without difficulty.

2. Adequate precautionary measures had not been taken by the Italian police and Carabinieri. Individual Carabinieri made efforts to defend Carretta but effective leadership was lacking.

3. Acting Chief Commissioner Stone of ACC and Region 4 Commissioner Poletti promptly conferred with Bonomi and Sforza, latter being minister in charge of epuration programme. Acting Chief Commissioner warned them of necessity for preventing recurrence at resumption of trial which on his advice was postponed until 20th Sept- thus permitting arrangements for adequate police measures and for limitation of attendance in courtroom. Precautions will be checked by officers of Region 4 ACC. Government will issue statement deploring incident and stating officers of police and Carabinieri concerned have been suspended pending investigation.

4. Acting Chief Commissioner further warned Honomi that if like disorders recurred it might be necessary to call our Allied troops. If Government unable to preserve order Allied Military Government would have to be reestablished over city of Rome.

5. Bonomi and Sforza fully appreciate the lessons to be learned from the incident and are expected to measure up to their responsibilities.

We continue receive reports from resistance movements France and other reliable sources saying increasing number American fliers on hand French peasants who unable get them moved towards Spanish frontier. Evident underground routes beginning fall down and that we should relieve situation. Suggest that through 89 we can organize our own lines to ease situation. Realize British handling this but feel that now facilities not sufficient.

Some conditions apply Switzerland. We could evacuate only two thru British channels. If you approve I will with 89 make concrete recommendations.

Such organization requires considerable funds. We can either utilize 89s facilities adjusting between OSS and WD in Washington or I can handle directly.

Presence large number our aviators in France, Belgium, Holland serious problem for those concealing our men in providing clothing, food and lodging. Many reports reach us that considerable number concealed Certavs area cannot be held much longer.



Personal observation during my Casablanca visit reveals that incidents of violent nature in that city also Fez and Rabat are due to German activity operating thru Spain Morocco and using Moorish nationalist leaders who were notorious even before landing.

French authorities have recently arrested some of these and claim to have situation under control. Well informed French circles criticize protectorate administration and charge ineptness in dealing with native affairs.

I believe situation would become burdensome to American military operations only if it got out of hand completely and grew into widespread Moslem religious revolt which according to my French informants is not unlikely. German Consul Kramer at Melilla particularly active.





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Summary

There are certain categories of war crimes which are either not mentioned in the Moscow Statement or to which the procedures envisaged by the Statement appear inapplicable. The main group is that of persons persecuted because of their belonging to a prescribed group (political opponents, "non-Aryans") and who usually are dealt with en masse as deportees in some "dumping ground" in Europe. The "Moscow" principle of trying the war criminals on the spot where the crime was committed seems here inappropriate. The answer in this case in similar cases seems to consist in handing over the accused to international agencies or courts for trial, instead of municipal courts.

Gaps in the Moscow "Statement on Atrocities"

The "Statement on Atrocities" issued by the Moscow Tripartite Conference has in many respects brought a clarification of the problem of how to deal with war crimes and war criminals. ^{2/} In some respects, however, the Statement does not deal with, or pays insufficient attention to certain problems and situations.

As is stated in the first paragraph of the Statement, the declaration was issued primarily because of the increasing danger of a "redoubling" of German cruelties and atrocities under the impact of the retreat of the "Hitlerite forces" from the invaded territories of Europe. It is therefore understandable that the Statement mentions only "German" perpetrators of atrocities and only atrocities committed on occupied territory. If this should be interpreted literally two categories of war criminals would escape punishment: non-German war criminals, and those (whether German or non-German) who have committed crimes on Axis territory. In the first category would come Italian, Hungarian, Rumanian, and Bulgarian war criminals as well as those nationals of occupied countries who in collaboration with the Axis have committed war crimes, e.g., Croatian, Norwegian, or Dutch "Quislings" as far as they are not already found in their respective countries but have fled to Germany or other Axis territory. That this was not the intention of the powers which issued the Statement can be seen from earlier declarations on war crimes and from one of the other Moscow documents. The declaration issued by representatives of nine

occupied countries expressly mentions satellite and quisling war criminals, and the Moscow declaration regarding Italy states that Italian-Fascist war criminals shall be brought to justice. The Statement on Atrocities must be interpreted in the light of these declarations so as to include the groups of potential war criminals mentioned.

In the second category of "omitted" crimes would be acts committed against Allied nationals in Germany or other Axis countries, e.g., maltreatment of prisoners of war or foreign workers transferred to those regions. It is obvious that the Three-Power Conference, in its declaration on war crimes, did not intend to leave such acts unpunished. But while war criminals of the first category may well be treated under the procedures envisaged in the Statement, those of the second category could not be handled under its provisions. Except for the case of "major criminals whose offenses have no particular geographical localization" and who shall be punished "by joint decision of the governments of the Allies," the Moscow Statement envisages a procedure under which those accused of war crimes shall be brought to trial "on the spot" where the crime has been committed, so that they may be tried "by the peoples whom they have outraged." In the case of acts committed on Axis territory against Allied nationals, analogous application of this stipulation would mean handing over the trial to former enemy courts. But even in case of a genuine revolution in the Axis countries which could guarantee serious prosecution of these acts by local authorities, it would appear somewhat incongruous to have the territorial criterion prevail over the more natural one of the

country to which the victim belonged or belongs. A possible solution of the difficulty would be to give jurisdiction over these cases either to Allied military courts established in occupied Axis territory or to the municipal courts of the countries from which the victims originated.

In addition to these obvious gaps there are certain other situations which do not seem to fit the procedures outlined in the Moscow Statement. They concern acts to which, in spite of the fact that they may have been committed by Germans in the invaded parts of Europe, the procedures of the Statement are either inapplicable or inappropriate.

The "ordinary" war crimes, such as shooting hostages, burning down of villages and killing their inhabitants, or the deportation of Allied nationals for slave labor, in spite of their brutality are still, unrelated to war conditions which prevail in a certain region or country, and to the often hostile attitude of its population. However, certain measures adopted by the Nazis whenever they invaded a new country have no connection with "time and space," but stem from a centrally planned and centrally executed policy, directed against certain groups of persons outside of any relation to the military, political, or economic war situation merely because they belong to a prescribed group. The most numerous as well as most conspicuous among these groups is that of the "non-Aryans," whether of Jewish faith or other belief. Hitler himself has repeatedly declared that this war would mean the end, by extermination, of the Jews in Europe, and recent statements by Nazi officials have even developed a theory that this war is essentially a war against members of

of the Jewish race, wherever they may be found. ^{1/} Similarly, a "war within the war" has been declared against persons of certain political, religious, or philosophical affiliation because of their opinions -- in particular, Communists, religious or other pacifists, or members of groups specially singled out and outlawed such as Jehovah's Witnesses (Ernste Bibel-forscher). As in the case of "non-Aryans," these groups have been dealt with on a "non-territorial" basis according to a general plan of persecution. Acts committed under this program can therefore scarcely be considered as having a "particular geographical localization" in the sense of the Moscow Statement, even if, apart from the "major criminals" in Berlin who planned them, they have been executed in definite places and regions. But aside from this more theoretical reason, there are a number of practical considerations which make it difficult to deal with this type of crime in the way envisaged by the Statement.

A number of different situations must be distinguished in this respect. Easiest to deal with under the Moscow Statement would be those cases in which the atrocities committed against the aforementioned groups have occurred entirely in the invaded country to which their members belong or belonged. For example, in case of those Czechoslovakian Jews who were herded into the ghetto-town of Terezin (Theresienstadt) in Czechoslovakia proper and there killed or otherwise maltreated or in the case of French Communists or Dutch pacifists persecuted in camps erected in France or Holland, it would appear as feasible and fitting to try the perpetrators, according to the Statement, "on the spot" where their crimes were committed.

Much more numerous, however, are those cases in which, according to the general Nazi plan of persecution and extermination, the acts committed against these groups have occurred all over Axis Europe, and where it is more or less a matter of coincidence or arbitrariness that one or the other phase, including the final one of extermination, has taken place in this or that spot of Europe. Under certain conditions of deportation it may even be difficult to establish where the final act has occurred. The victim may have died en route, or may have starved, or frozen to death, or suffocated in the cattle car in which he was shipped East. Thus it is more or less a coincidence whether death occurred while he was still in the country of his origin, while being transported through Axis territory, or when he had arrived in the country of his destination. Extermination of Jews has in most cases been perpetrated in one particular region of Europe -- Eastern Poland -- which thus has come to constitute a kind of dumping-ground for most European "non-Aryans." It would appear strangely incongruous to have Polish courts try the cases of non-Polish Jews merely because the final stage of the Nazi anti-Jewish program happened to be executed on Polish territory. It is clear from wording and context of the Moscow Statement that the rationale of the envisaged procedure is the intimate connection between the atrocities committed and the sense of "outrage" produced in the people who have witnessed it and on whose families, friends, neighbors, or at least compatriots, it has been inflicted. Quite different from the shooting of hostages in the marketplace of their town, are executions which take place in a camp far away from the country of the victim (usually located in a region inaccessible

even to the inhabitants of that region). These crimes do not contain that element of connection between crime and people "on the spot" which the Statement presupposes. Courts in, and of, the country of deportation cannot therefore be supposed to show that amount of interest in just retribution which they naturally have in the cases committed against their compatriots. The fact of racial, religious, or political persecution of the victims in these cases can in itself not be supposed to be a strong enough inducement to energetic prosecution in all cases, in particular in certain groups countries where they may be inclined to regard one or the other motive of persecution with indifference or even indulgence. On the other hand it would seem to run counter to the principles of the Allied cause to permit acts to go by unpunished which, even more so than "ordinary" war crimes, constitute what is reprehensible in totalitarian policies and that the Moscow Declarations have vowed to destroy.

The territorial criterion, even if it could be established, here seems insignificant as compared with that of the group or the country to which the victim belonged. In cases where the victim is, or was, a national of an Allied country, it might be an appropriate procedure to give his country, and not that of the location of his maltreatment, jurisdiction to try his tormentors. Thus, cases of massacres of Dutch Communists or French Jews would be referred to Dutch or French courts even if they occurred in Poland or Russia. In many cases the direct relation between trial and outraged sense of justice of the people concerned, which the Statement seeks to establish, would thus be created, since frequently the population of the country of the victim has been more agitated by the

deportation of compatriots and the cruelty which this involved, than have the people of the place of final execution by the final stage of the act. It would not over provide those governments of liberated countries which wish to dissociate themselves from Nazi or "collaborationist" policies of racial, religious, or political persecution with a means to demonstrate their ideals through a powerful symbolic act. It is conceivable, for example, that a future French government will desire to demonstrate its adherence to the traditional French ideal of equality and tolerance and its abhorrence of Vichy policies by exacting, through French courts, retribution from the persecutors of French Jews, whose coreligionists would thus be solemnly restored to the comrunity of the nation. A legal difficulty lies in the fact that most Continental penal codes do not provide for trial and punishment of crimes committed outside the respective country by a non-national of that country. This difficulty might be eliminated either by changing the codes or by considering these types of crimes as delits continus whose initial phase has been committed by deporting the victims from their original domicile.

There remain those cases in which neither the country of execution of the crime nor the country of origin of the victim furnishes a basis of prosecution. German communists, living as emigrés in Belgium and after Nazi invasion killed in a camp established in Belgium, Germany, or Poland, or stateless Jews shipped from their residence to the East, furnish examples of this category. Moreover, it would appear that the case of German or other Axis nationals persecuted within their own country, before

or after the outbreak of the war, because of their political conviction or their racial origin come likewise into this category. German or Rumanian Jews, Pacifists, Socialists, persecuted within their countries in pursuance of Nazi or fascist politics, constitute elements of the general Nazi program just as much as do members of the same group which, by chance, had the nationality of one of the occupied countries or, without even possessing such nationality, happened to be shipped beyond Axis boundaries into occupied territory. While it is true that such acts, according to traditional standards of international law, belong to the "internal domain" of the countries concerned and therefore are no "war crimes" in the traditional sense, it is also true that the war of extermination conducted by Hitlerism against non-Aryans or political opponents cannot be measured by traditional standards. These measures, as integral parts of one continuous policy, would appear to demand "equal treatment" with that envisaged for the atrocities considered as "war crimes" in the narrower sense.

The way to deal with these cases satisfactorily under the Moscow Statement can be derived from its last paragraph, that which envisages treatment of certain cases by "joint decision of the governments of the Allies." While this procedure, according to the text, shall be applied to "major" criminals whose offenses have no particular geographical localization, its rationale would also refer to those outside the circle of the key planners who have committed acts against members of groups as such and who, for the reasons mentioned above, cannot be handled through the localized procedure. The question whether, by joint decision, some joint

agency or international court should be given jurisdiction would, in itself, be a matter for joint decision. There would also have to be a decision about the law which the international body could have to apply. There are no precedents as to the type of law concerned -- whether the martial law of one of the Allies, or the respective municipal law of the accused, or rules of _____ to be established by the agency or court. The Moscow Statement seems to have apparently left these problems open for future decision -- a gap which will have to be filled sometime in the not too distant future.

A common decision of the Allies would also be required to regulate the problem of jurisdiction in the other case where, as shown above, a solution deviating from the Moscow Statement is desirable: the case where courts in the country of origin, and not courts in the country of deportation should be given jurisdiction. Such jurisdiction can only be transferred by common decision of the Allies. Thus, a number of further joint steps are necessary in order to implement the Statement and to guarantee a satisfactory solution of all cases arising in connection with Axis atrocities.

SABOTAGING THE ENEMY'S EFFORT IN CHINA

1. It is my belief and opinion that a very important angle in conducting our China campaign is being overlooked. I refer to the prospects of making use of skilled civilian Chinese cooperation in enemy occupied areas. Educated Chinese, American and European trained, who have been engaged in various branches of the engineering professions, or who have been employed by such foreign firms in China as the Standard Oil Company of New York, The Texas Company, the General Electric Company and others, should be organized to assist us in our effort.

2. Chinese individuals of the type mentioned above would rarely be found fighting in the ranks of the Chinese Army, but they would, I believe, undertake to sabotage enemy installations, transportation, etc., for compensation. This has been attempted to some degree by China's guerrillas but never in an intelligently organized manner. Much that we are now attempting to do by air attack, at great expense in highly trained personnel and equipment, we should be able to successfully accomplish through a skilled force, properly organized, directed from Chungking, Kuming or an advanced base.

3. We have been guilty of gross negligence in not making a serious attempt before this to organize the active cooperation of the civilian population of China in occupied areas. We left this entirely to the Chinese Government to do, with the result that little has been done. Bridges, railroad shops, concentration points, warehouses, enemy operated industries, wharves and shipping could be sabotaged according to plan, by the proper organization.

4. Compensation for such sabotage and destruction should be handled by our own designated agents upon satisfactory proof of the accomplished mission.

5. I have discussed this plan with Col. Jesse C. Williams, G.S.C., A-2 of the Fourteenth Air Force, and with Lt. Col. Kenneth H. Gibson, AAF, both outstanding officers and each of them emphatically stated that such a program deserved prompt consideration.

6. In conclusion, I beg to state that I sincerely believe a plan such as I have attempted to describe could be speedily organized and put in operation. A special section of A-2 officers, qualified by experience and training for duty in China and attached to Headquarters of the Fourteenth Air Force, could efficiently administer the program.

Reference our W 5312/1326 and our W-5490 of 18 November. Signed Eisenhower cite NAGAP and FHGAB to AGWAR.

We have directed 5th Army to forward to this Headquarters a summary of the investigation conducted. We have put an immediate stop on all publicity and PWB activity on these matters. General Alexander has personally recommended that we proceed carefully in our dealings with German Prisoners of War held as war criminals in order that the enemy may not be given an excuse for reprisals on our Prisoners. Also desire to avoid furnishing Germany and Japan excuse for declaring Articles 60 to 67 inclusive, of the Geneva Convention, inoperative. Urgently recommend a policy of no war criminal trials until after the War.

Careful sifting of all alleged incidents will be made here and complete records under the circumstances secured under procedure outlined in your 1151. Request specific instructions on ultimate disposition to be made of individuals concerned. Pending your reply individuals implicated will continue to be segregated and held here. Where Germans and other Axis Nationals are concerned we will be most careful to maintain status as Prisoners of War pending your decisions in each case.

President has approved Donovan's suggestion that Sidney Weinberg go to Russia openly as representative of OSS. Weinberg, however, has not yet accepted the appointment. Discussions concerning establishment of OSS Mission in Moscow have taken place in London between Colonel Hill, Chief of the British SOE Moscow Mission, and Colonel Vanderblue of OSS. Judging from Vanderblue's summary of these discussions, Colonel Hill favors the establishment of an OSS Mission in Moscow parallel to the British SOE Mission and believes that work undertaken at this time by such an OSS Mission would aid operations against Japan when and if Russia declares war. Donovan has written you under date of November 5 concerning the establishment of an OSS Mission kindred to the British SOE Mission. In the interest of expediting this matter will you furnish your reaction and also Harriman's on the proposal. Your comments if favorable should include suggestions as to the size of OSS representation, if established, its composition and relationship to yourself.

Subject: The Effect of Weather Upon Air Operations During
November on the Route Gibraltar to Cairo

1. November marks the beginning of the stormy season in the western Mediterranean area. During this month Gibraltar, the western terminus of the route, presents an average of 11 days with precipitation, while Cairo, the eastern terminus, presents an average of 2 to 6 days.

2. Cloudiness during November varies from 50%^{at the time} at Gibraltar to 30% at Cairo. Only one or two days of fog are expected during the month. Thunderstorms may be expected not more than 2 or 3 days during November.

3. Considering the route as a whole, summations of the flying hazards would indicate that an average of 20 flyable days will be possible on the route from Gibraltar to Cairo. From Cairo to Gibraltar, at least 15 flyable days may be depended upon.

The Why of the Ramirez Revolt

Hitler Has Nest Feathered in Argentina, U. S. Warned

By United Press

NEW YORK, Jan. 19—The New York World-Telegram said today that the State Department has been warned by sources inside Argentina that Hitler has "prepared a future haven" for himself there.

The dispatch also said the State Department has been informed that the Nazis engineered the Ramirez revolution in Argentina and that Germany is lining up other South American countries against the United States.

"When the Nazis saw defeat staring them in the face at Tunis, according to the report, they realized it was time to prepare a haven for themselves and their capital," the Scripps-Howard paper said. "The United Nations had made it clear they intended to punish all Axis war criminals and the Nazi leaders realized that no European neutral could offer protection."

"What better place could Hitler find than a country in the New World easy to prepare as a haven and one which the United Nations would hesitate to invade for fear of being accused of imperialism by her other good neighbors?" the report is quoted.

"Thus," the dispatch continued, "it is plain that Germany began a systematic study of Argentina's hopes and fears and weaknesses. The Nazis corrupted her politicians, bribed her officials, spread propaganda thru the press, radio and church and finally furnished the will and push to engineer a crafty revolution to meet her needs."

"The document concludes," the dispatch said, "with a plea that the United States take immediate steps—economic to begin with, military if necessary—to bring about an early downfall of Argentina's dictator and restore the country to its people, the majority of whom, it is held, are pro-democratic."

To Eisenhower, Freedom, Algiers, from the Combined Chiefs
of Staff, FAN 260.

Answering your NAF 476, procedure under paragraph 7
of policy directive of June 1 is to be followed. Trials
by military courts of persons suspected of war crimes should
not be held. Such persons should be held and kept in custody
by Allied command pending decision by United Nations as to
their disposal.

While suspects are under detention by Allied command the
latter is to be responsible for collecting all available in-
formation about them and about war crimes of which they are
suspected, and will forward all such information to the
Combined Chiefs of Staff in order that it may be communicated
to the Allied government most concerned for transmission by
that government to the United Nations War Crimes Commission
which is now being set up in accordance with decisions
reached at meeting of Allied governments in London on October
20th.

It is intended that this commission shall review and
record information submitted to it by the United Nations
governments relating to war crimes committed by enemy
against nationals of United Nations, and shall report to
governments concerned all cases where it appears that adequate
evidence may be expected to be forthcoming. It will also
consider the setting up of machinery to enable common policy
to be worked out in matters such as type of courts to be
employed for trial of war criminals, laws to be applied,
procedure for custody and surrender of criminals, etc.

Crimes committed by Italians against Italian Nationals would not, strictly speaking, be war crimes and would not therefore come within the purview of the United Nations Commission. Such persons should be handed over to the Italian Government for trial.

Persons who commit crimes against your command during your period of occupation, however, may, as usual, be charged and tried before military tribunals appointed by you.

To AGWAR for Hilldring from Holmes signed Eisenhower cite PHMGS reference your 5278 19 December.

Matter of Soviet representation was discussed in detail at a meeting of Advisory Council where it became clear that the Soviet Government and Mr Vyshinsky had not fully appreciated what was involved. Vyshinsky is making recommendation to his government of the following lines "There will be a Soviet and a French" member "Of the Commission. Their functions will be consultative. Just as the Commander in Chief in his capacity of President of the Control Commission receives the advice of the Advisory Council in matters of policy affecting Italy, the Deputy President would normally consult the principal members of his staff concerned in matters relating to the day to day functioning of the control commission, within the terms of the general directives and instructions received from the Commander in Chief.

It is not proposed that the right to appoint members of the commission should be further extended."

If the Soviet Government accepts this proposal I consider the arrangement acceptable.
