Poughkeepsie, Dutchess County, N.Y. Oct. 21, 1910

(excerpt) "... In any campaign the voters are in danger of losing sight of what the questions they have to vote on really mean. In other words, the issues of the campaign. The party which has the weakest side of the issues, or the wrong side will always do its best to take away the attention of the voters from these issues and to substitute other things that are not issues. And this is true of the campaign being waged by the Republican party today. They are trying to make you believe that "bossism" is the issue, that the Republican party is free from 'bossism,' and that no respectable man can vote for any Democrat and keep his self-respect. Now that kind of talk is pure dust - dust thrown in the eyes of the people. But it won't go here. I know, for no man can tell me that the Democratic party of Dutchess County represents bossism, and no man can tell me that the Republican party of Dutchess is free from bossism, and if you don't believe it, go ask the postmaster.

What the voters have got to do is to clean their house this year. They are going to discharge the unfaithful servant, and they are going to put in a new servant who stands for cleanliness, honesty and economy, and the people of the State are going to get a clean house, a house of which they will be proud...."
