ADDRESSES MADE BY MR. LANDON, STATE SENATOR ROOSEVELT AND CHIEF HARRY ARNOLD AT LUNCHEON SERVED.

The fire departments of Staatsburg and Hyde Park were entertained at the residence of Hon. Francis G. Landon at the former place Friday afternoon.

The guests assembled at the residence in the Landon estate and proceeded to the Landon residence, where they were welcomed by Mr. Landon. This followed remarks by the speakers, after which the party witnessed a most elaborate display of pyrotechnics. Mr. Landon then invited his guests to a substantial luncheon. The visitors were then a most enjoyable evening. From Hyde Park came the Eagle Engine company with the Catawag Drain Corps of Pokenepsie, the Rescue Hook and Ladder company and company from Staatsburg, headed by Fire Chief Albert Zeph and his assistant, Theodore DeGroot. From Staatsburg were the members of the Dinwiddie Hose company and the Dinwiddie Hook, headed by Fire Chief Harry Arnold.

Addresses were made both by Mr. Landon and State Senator Franklin D. Roosevelt, in which they urged elections and a reconstruction of the Plains compact.
