HARVARD CLUB HEARS SECRETARY ROOSEVELT

After Dinner Speaker Talks On
Enlarging Navy's
Scope

CARVEL HALL BANQUET

Fifty members and guests of the Harvard Club, of Annapolis, sat at dinner at Carvel Hall last evening, and were participants in a very enjoyable evening.

Dinner was served in the ball room where an orchestra furnished music throughout the evening. The president of the Annapolis Harvard Club, Sidney Gunn, 1904, presided and introduced the speakers, who included: T. T. McCabe, 1912; J. W. Hollowell, 1901, representing the Harvard Club of Washington; Franklin D. Roosevelt, 1914, Assistant Secretary of the Navy, and Admiral A. H. Scales, Superintendent of the Naval Academy.

All of the addresses were interesting, and that of Assistant Secretary Roosevelt was especially so, dealing as it did with the Navy and the Naval Academy. Mr. Roosevelt talked on plans of the navy, and the practicability of enlarging the scope of the Naval Academy to include a regular

course for Naval Reserve officers. If ever there were another war, he said, naval reserve officers would be needed just as they had been in the last war, and were a course provided they would be on hand when wanted.

Admiral Scales, too, made a very graceful speech, and the high regard in which he is held by the civilian corps of the Naval Academy was made manifest by the way it was received. Mr. McCabe spoke of the value of education in warfare, he having had experience with the British Army in Italy and elsewhere, and Mr. Hollowell spoke on behalf of the Harvard campaign now on to raise \$15,000,000 to increase the salaries of its teachers.

There are upwards of thirty Harvard men in Annapolis, and while most of them are connected with the Naval Academy some are not. Calvert Magruder, son of Mrs. Daniel Magruder, of Duke of Gloucester street, graduated from the Law School in 1916, with very high honors, and Professor Angelo Hall, of Madison street, has two sons who are undergraduates in Harvard College now. Besides this there are at least three former St. John's boys now at Harvard. Capt. C. C. Jarman is in the Graduate School of Business Administration, and Fendall Marbury and J. W. Noble are in the Law School.
