My friends, I am very happy to be here in the Capital City of Missouri. This is our first day out.
We are travelling by train across the Continent and back.

We have had a happy day -- all of us -- because we woke up this morning to the announcement of the important news, that Maine had gone Democratic. (Hurrah! -- prolonged applause) If Maine does that, what is Missouri going to do? (Prolonged applause)

I am happy to be here tonight, and especially happy to be introduced by one of my oldest friends -- Senator Reed. (Applause)

I am glad to be here with another old friend -Harry Hawes, (applause) and with a youngster whom I used
to know in the old days when his splendid father was the
Speaker of the House -- your new Senator. (Hurrah! -applause) I just came here to say "howdy" to you. We
