INFORMAL EXTEMPORANEOUS REMARKS OF GOVERNOR ROOSEVELT FROM THE REAR PLATFORM OF HIS SPECIAL TRAIN

HOLDREGE, NEBRASKA, September 28, 1932

.... The Governor told the crowd the story of the group who said they would "vote for Hoover" if he did not come out, and also about the woman who told Jimmie Roosevelt that she would wake the Governor if he did not.

.... The Governor then introduced Mrs. Roosevelt, who was greeted by a great deal of applause. The Governor introduced Senator Walsh of Montana and Senator Pittman of Nevada.

.... The Governor asked, "What are you getting for your corn?"

THE AUDIENCE: Thirteen and fourteen cents a bushel.

THE GOVERNOR: And wheat?

THE AUDIENCE: Thirty cents.

THE GOVERNOR: What grade is that?

THE AUDIENCE: Number two.

THE GOVERNOR: Was it ever lower here?

THE AUDIENCE: Not that I ever knew of. Hoover can't get it any lower. I have been here twenty years and never knew it to be lower.

THE GOVERNOR: Any dairying?

THE AUDIENCE: Some.

THE GOVERNOR: What are you getting for butter fat?

THE AUDIENCE: Seventeen cents.

THE GOVERNOR: The usual price is about thirty-five cents.

THE AUDIENCE: About thirty cents is fair.

THE GOVERNOR: They were only getting thirteen cents for butter fat down in Arizona, the day before yesterday.

THE AUDIENCE: There has been a change in the market the last two or three weeks.

THE GOVERNOR: Do you raise any sheep here?

THE AUDIENCE: No.

THE GOVERNOR: Well, I have simply got to go back and work on that Sioux City speech, so I will bid you all good night, if you will excuse me. (The Governor then left the platform.)
