SPEECH OF GOVERNOR FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT

Ayer, Massachusetts
October 29, 1932

I think I can very properly say, "My old friends," because some of you good people were here when I was here over forty years ago. I often think of that early age, coming to Ayer, and on many, many an occasion in the wintertime and in the summertime, sometimes on wheels and sometimes on runners, we would come up in the old horse-drawn berouche from Ayer up to the school, and then, of course, I do feel as if I have a certain what may be called responsibility toward the people of Ayer because on several occasions, over thirty years, I used to teach Sunday school down here.

It certainly is fine to come back. I little thought when I was at school that I would ever speak as a candidate for anything in Ayer, but here I am and I do hope in the days to come to be able to come back and see you again.
