TO THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES:

The long-known and the long-expected have happened. The movement of world conquest, accompanied by methods of enslavement, barbaric lawlessness, general destruction, and fiendish cruelty, without a parallel, is headed straight toward this hemisphere in accordance with full notice long since given by repeated acts and utterances of international brigands led by Hitler. Never before has a challenge to life, liberty and civilization been so completely world-wide and so utterly diabolical in its beastly nature. Every rational civilized person is faced with the imperative and inescapable responsibility of resisting to the utmost. Delay is destruction. Quick, united effort everywhere will insure a world victory of the forces of law and justice and righteousness over the forces of slavery and savagery. Germany has declared war against the United States, and the United States should promptly accept the state of war that Germany has thus instituted.

Italy has also declared war against the United States.

I therefore request the Congress to recognize the existence of a state of war between the United States and Germany, and between the United States and Italy.

MR. EARLY:

The long expected is now a reality. We have received the official notification of the declaration of war. The Secretary of State has notified the President. The State Department was advised this morning by the German Charge here. The American Embassy in Rome has reported that it was advised in Rome. So, Germany has declared War. Italy has goose-stepped apparently in compliance with orders. A Message will be transmitted to the Congress at noon today by the President. The Senate Leader and the Speaker have both advised that resolutions will be promptly introduced and passed.
