Three things:


(1) Immeasurable, literally, for now and all time are the significance and the value of your Hitler-Mussolini letters. The overwhelming sentiment in the country will support you in all of this. Splendid! Splendid!!

(2) You should know of the conclusion of Roy Howard's speech at the General de Chambrun dinner last night. There were about two hundred top men present and the set program included speeches by General de Chambrun, Andre Maurois, and President Seymour of Yale. Then, without notice, the toastmaster asked Roy Howard, who had returned yesterday from abroad, to tell them something about conditions. He, of course, commanded special attention because of where he had been. His observations were most impressive. He closed with the statement that no President had ever stood as high with the chanceries of Europe and that the country should unanimously back your foreign program.

(3) You will be interested in knowing that I had a long talk with Secretary Hopkins last week in Washington before he went away and I am going to proceed with him to carry out the program as soon as he gets back. I am meeting with Frank Walker tomorrow here to discuss it all. Frank will be most useful in all constructive ways in connection with the whole matter.
