Exports to Russia, China, Burma, Hong Kong, Japan, France and other blocked countries, as reported to the Treasury Department during the week ending December 27, 1941.

1. Exports to Russia

Exports to Russia as reported to the Treasury during the week ending December 27, 1941 amounted to about \$1,800,000, the lowest figure for any single week since October 18. The principal item was motor trucks and chassis, which accounted for about one-half of the total amount. (See Appendix C.)

2. Exports to China, Burma and Hong Kong

Exports to Free China were valued at only \$1,000, the lowest total for any single week since the beginning of September. (See Appendix D.) Exports to Burma, however, amounted to \$196,000 of which printing ink and motor trucks and chassis were the principal items. A large percentage of the exports to Burma are for reexport to Free China. (See Appendix F.)

Exports to Occupied China amounted to \$36,000. (See Appendix E.)

No exports to Hong Kong were reported during the week under review.

3. Exports to Japan

No exports to Japan were reported during the week under review.

4. Exports to France

No exports to France were reported during the week ending December 27, 1941.

5. Exports to other blocked countries

Exports to other blocked countries are given in Appendix A.

Exports to Russia, China, Burma, Hong Kong, Japan, France and other blocked countries, as reported to the Treasury Department during the week ending January 3, 1942.

1. Exports to Russia

Exports to Russia as reported to the Treasury during the week ending January 3, 1942 amounted to about \$4,000,000 as compared with approximately \$1,800,000 during the previous week. Military tanks and parts accounted for more than one-half of the total amount. (See Appendix C.)

2. Exports to China, Burma and Hong Kong

Exports to Free China amounted to \$35,000. (See Appendix D.) Exports to Burma amounted to only \$2,000. (See Appendix E.)

No exports to Occupied China or Hong Kong were reported during the week under review.

3. Exports to Japan

No exports to Japan were reported during the week under review.

4. Exports to France

No exports to France were reported during the week ending January 3, 1942.

January 22, 1942

Exports to Russia, China, Burma, Hong Kong, Japan, France and other blocked countries, as reported to the Treasury Department during the week ending January 10, 1942.

1. Exports to Russia

Exports to Russia as reported to the Treasury during the week ending January 10, 1942 amounted to over \$3,000,000, as compared with approximately \$4,000,000 during the previous week. This is the highest figure for any single week since America's entrance into the war. The principal item was motor trucks and chassis. (See Appendix C.)

2. Exports to China, Burma and Hong Kong

Exports to Free China amounted to only \$91,000. (See Appendix D.) Exports to Burma, however, amounted to over \$1,000,000. (See Appendix E.)

No exports to Occupied China or Hong Kong were reported during the week under review.

3. Exports to Japan

No exports to Japan were reported during the week under review.

4. Exports to France

No exports to France were reported during the week under review.



1. Exports to Russia

Exports to Russia as reported during the ten-day period ending April 30, 1942 amounted to nearly \$51,000,000 as compared with approximately \$67,000,000 during the previous ten-day period. Motor trucks and land planes were the two principal items. (See Appendix C.)

2. Exports to Free China and Burma

Exports to Free China during the period under review amounted to about \$2,827,000, of which military equipment accounted for more than ninety percent. (See Appendix D.)

Exports to Russia, Free China, Burma and other blocked countries, as reported to the Treasury Department during the ten-day period ending June 10, 1942

1. Exports to Russia

Exports to Russia as reported during the ten-day period ending June 10, 1942 amounted to about \$12,764,000, representing the lowest total for any ten-day period since the beginning of February. Among the military equipment exported were thirteen light bombers. (See Appendix C.)

2. Exports to Free China and Burma

Exports to Free China during the ten-day period ending June 10, 1942 amounted to about \$3,399,000, of which military equipment accounted for about 90 percent. (See Appendix D.)

Exports to Burma amounted to \$234,000. Military equipment accounted for the entire amount. (See Appendix E.)

3. Exports to France

No exports to France were reported during the period under review.

4. Exports to other blocked countries

Exports to other blocked countries are given in Appendix A. Most important were exports to Switzerland amounting to \$343,000.
