SUBJECT: Reporter from AMERICAN WEEKLY Going to Portugal to Get
Refugee Story.

This morning Charles Robbins of the AMERICAN WEEKLY telephoned me from New York in response to a suggestion made by a mutual friend. He has a reservation on a Portuguese steamer leaving New York, April 22. The purpose of his visit to Portugal is to gather "human interest" stories on the refugees now there. I suggested to Robbins that he come to Washington if possible, so that we could give him background on the refugee situation in Portugal, my intention being to get him started on the right foot. Robbins stated that he did not know whether or not he could do so. I then suggested that a talk between him and someone from this office be arranged in New York before Robbins' departure. He welcomed the suggestion. This information was passed on to Mr. Lesser who said that he might be able to see Robbins in New York.
