MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILES

Conference Held in Miss Hodel's Office on January 9, 1945

Present: Mrs. Edward Jacobs, former president of Hadassah and now honorary vice-president of that organization, and Matthew J. Marks of the War Refugee Board.

Mrs. Jacobs informed me that a fund of approximately \$103,000 has been contributed to a special project, the purpose of which is to prepare a village in Palestine to receive and rehabilitate 100 refugee youths. The project is called "FREEDOM VILLAGE FOR PALESTINE." Apparently, more funds for this same project are available if they are required.

Mrs. Jacobs desires to proceed to Palestine as soon as possible in order that actual work on the project may be commenced. She wished to know whether the War Refugee Board could aid her in obtaining a travel priority. I advised Mrs. Jacobs that under the terms of reference from the President, the War Refugee Board deals only with rescue matters and that inasmuch as her trip had no relation to questions of rescue, it would not be possible for the Board to help her.

Mrs. Jacobs appeared satisfied with this reason, and then asked my advice on how best to go about obtaining transportation. Inasmuch as she claimed to be personally acquainted with Mr. Dean Acheson, I advised her to speak to him about the question.
