Dear Mr. Jelinek.

As your parents had asked me to inform you, I shall tell you their sad story. Your parents used to see us from time to time, but later when the Germans began to pursue the Jews, they did not dare to go away far from home, then we called on them. One day, when we announced our visit by telephone, the portress answered Mr. & Mrs. J. had been arrested by the Germans in February 1943 and brought to Malines to be deported to Poland. Since we had no news from them. Before your mother had handed me some effects to keep them for you as a souvenir.

By the way I have to tell you that Mr. Rosenberg, my brother in law, interned in France till August 42 was delivered to the Germans, and Mrs. R., my sister, was arrested here by the Germans in June 1944 and
