As Chairman of the War Refugee Eoard, perhaps you would be interested in an idea which I think would be an effective means to help raise money necessary to rescue refugees.

A federally legalized lottery, run by our Government, with tickets obtainable at all Post Offices would, I believe, be an effective means of raising a substantial sum for this worthy cause. Tickets should be sold for a nominal sum, such as \$1 each and prizes could range from \$100. to \$1000. in War Bonds.

If the question of running a lottery is legal, it should be made so if it could save so many human lives.
