Dear Sir:

The Wetherlands Jewish Society thanks you for your very kind letter of February 8, 1944, and is grateful to you for giving them the opportunity of putting before your Board their suggestions for the rescue of Jews.

There is a very urgent matter which is receiving the ottertion of our Society. It is the possibility of the exchange of Dutch Jews now kept in a special internment camp in southern Germany. About 800 to 1000 Butch Jews are kept in this comp and could go to Palestine if satisfectory arrangements can be made. We understand that certificates for the entry into Palestine have been issued for them, but that the difficulty is to find in equal number of German nationals who would have to be sent back to Germany in their place. This whole question has also been discussed by the Butch Jewish Porese tative Committee of the World Jewish Congress, to which belong the president and other members of the Bether-thinds Jewish Society. Cables have been sent to the Dutch Gry-rament in London requesting the speeding up of this matter.

The "orld Jewis Congress has incorporated this question of the Outch Jews in their Memorandum which we understand they are sending you. It is, therefore, unnecessary for us to give any further details, out we would most earnestly request that this matter be treated with the greatest urgency. From information reaching us, we gether that the Germans begin to accome impatient of the long delay, and that there is now a possibility that these Dutchmen will no longer be kept in a separate camp, but that they will of deported with all the terrible consequences that they mill of deported with all the rich that their lives may be lost. It is for these reasons that we urgently request that this matter be looked into and a that even thing be done at the carliest possible moment to save these Jews.

The are convinced that this is one of the cases in which your Board could be extremely helpful.
