The New School has been very much concerned with the problems created by the displacement of individuals and whole ethnic or religious groups as a result of tyrenny in Europe. Therefore, it welcomed the suggestion of the Hias-Ica Emigration Association, Inc. to sponsor a training course for social workers in the field of migration, with particular reference to displaced Jewish populations in Europe.

This course has been conducted most successfully since the end of February. It has attracted the attention of social agencies, universities and institutions interested in the problem.

At its opening session Mr. Earl G. Harrison, Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, and Mr. Pierre Waelbroek, Assistant Director of the International Labor Organization, were among the guest speakers.

The closing session will take place in our auditorium on Wednesday, May 31st, 1944, at 8:30 P.M. The-main topic will be "Future Trends in Migration Policies." The first undersigned will be in the chair.

We all are anxious to have you as one of the guest speakers. Nothing can be more important and more interesting for our student body and for the audience gathered at this occasion than an authoritative statement on the task, the present work and the plans of the War Relief Board. It is our sincere hope that you will be able to make such a statement in the form of an address of about twenty minutes during the session.

Other guest speakers will be Mr. Harry Greenstein, head of the Welfare Division, UNRRA, who will speak on "The Place of Private Organizations in the Relief and Rehabilitation Program of the UNRRA," and Mr. Paul Van Zeeland, president of the Coordinating Foundation whose address will deal with "The Regulation of Migration After the War and the Need for a Central Intergovernmental Agency."

We feel that this course has made a significant contribution to the training of social workers in the field of migration as well as to the clarification of some of the problems implied. We, therefore, think you will find it worth your while to favor the course with a statement of the War Refugee Board which under your direction is destined to solve practically some of the questions with which the whole series has been concerned. Though wé know the heavy demands made on your time we feel that our call deserves your favorable attention.



Training Course on Migration Problems

Training Course on Theory of Migration and Methods of Emigrant Aid Work Offered by HIAS-ICA Under the Auspices of the New School for Social Research

Practical questions of post-war activities, both at home and overseas. are at present the order of the day in all fields of social, economic and political reconstruction. In the wide field of the 'three R's' in Europe-Relief, Rehabilitation and Reconstructionvarious recent initiatives have shown the importance and the urgent necessity of training future overseas administrators and social workers-to begin with in Europe-and giving them the information which they will require in the successful carrying out of the manifold tasks awaiting them abroad.

The various educational post-graduate programs in the process of realization have roused a good deal of interest, especially among present and prospective social workers. The program of civilian training for International Administration inaugurated by Columbia University, the special courses offered by the New School for Social Research on Public Administration in Europe and the course of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee in the special field of relief and rehabilitation show how important it is to prepare social workers of all categories for their new postwar tasks overseas. Within the allembracing scope of post-war relief and reconstruction - especially in Europe, and with particular reference to the desperate situation of Jews in Nazi-occupied countries -- migration will doubtless be one of the most important factors in the resettlement and reconstruction of displaced Jew-Yet this aspect of ish populations. relief and rehabilitation has not so far had the attention it rightly deserves, and has barely been touched upon in the various training programs hitherto elaborated.

The Jewish organizations specializing in all aspects of migration—Hias and the Jewish Colonization Association (ICA) for over a half century, and Hicem (HIAS-ICA Emigration Association) for the last two decades —have now taken steps to fill this gap. Under the auspices of the New School for Social Research they are organizing a special three-month course on the theory of migration and the methods for emigrant aid work.

ļ

This course will help to train in the specific field of migrations those social workers who are already equipped, or are in the progress of being equipped for overseas and particularly European activities. It will begin about the middle of February and will be subdivided into four main sets of subjects.

First, a series of *four* lectures will give a general review of the origin and character of modern migrations; the international, historical, demographic and economic aspects of migrations will be explained and the theory of migratory movements will be expounded.

This will be followed by a series of *fourteeu* sessions surveying the laws and regulations dealing with migrations in various countries. The lectures will deal with legislation both in countries of immigration (U.S.A., South and Central America, Palestine, etc.) and in those of emigration (Germany, Poland, Rumania), as well as in transit countries and countries of refuge (France, England, Portugal, Spain, etc.).

The third section of the course will deal, during *ten* further sessions, with the specific problems of *Jewish migrations*. The causes and effects of Jewish migration and the various phases of Jewish colonization will be discussed. The procedure and technique in countries of emigration and of immigration will be gone into and the *modus operandi* from the moment a prospective emigrant applies for ëmigration until his arrival and settlement in the new country will be explained.

A fourth section, lasting *nine* sessions, will give extended information about the various government agencies and private organizations which in one way or another deal with migration work. These lectures will be given by authoritative representatives of each of these bodies.

Before the actual beginning of the Training Course, the students will be addressed at an opening session by prominent authorities in the field of migrations, while another special session held at the close of the Training Course will give the general lines of the post-war programs of Hias, ICA and Hicem.


