Dear Bayor:

I have your letter of November 21, 1944, concerning your desire to have your brother and your niece come to the United States from Hungary.

The Board, in collaboration with the Department of State, has developed a program calculated to assist persons in enemy controlled areas for whom American immigration visas were authorized on or after July 1, 1941.

If the visa for which your brother applied was authorized or renewed on or after that date, I suggest that you advise us as to his full name, the date and place of his birth, the date of issuance or authorization of such visa or renewal thereof, and the file number assigned by the Department of State to any correspondence in connection therewith.

If no such visa was authorized or renewed for your brother or your niece on or after July 1, 1941, I regret that there is no specific action that the Board can take in their behalf beyond its general programs in the interest of the victims of enemy persecution. Please be assured, however, that we are doing everything within our power, consistent with the successful prosecution of the war, to assist the victims of enemy persecution and we sincerely hope that the Board's efforts have helped them.
