Dear Mrs. Frankman:

I have your letter of July 20, 1944, requesting the assistance of the War Refugee Board in bringing your brother and his wife from Italy to the United States.

I am sure you will understand that the task of the Board is so great that, of necessity, it cannot deal with problems limited to seeking out and rescuing specific individuals. We are, of course, doing everything in our power to rescue and save the victims of enemy persecution who are in imminent danger of death.

I am enclosing a list of private organizations which I am advised may be in a position to be of some help to you in this matter, and suggest that you refer your problem to any one of them.

The above, having been barbarously treated and starved in Sermany, Sought refuge in Italy, where their condition tid not improve, hovever, after having been in a concentration camp and suffered privations of the worst sort, there, their health has been undermined to such an extent, that I am afraid, that unless they are granted a refrage in this country, they may may Survive long, allow me to add that just before the ontbreak of the present war, they had had most of the arrangements made for them, for their immigration into the United States, but the war has prevented their The prospective immigrant, Oskar Galdman And the second

has a numerous family in the United States: three brothers& myself (a sister), all citizens of the U.S.A. and responsible persons, willing and ready to assist the prospective immigrants to the utmost ability, financially and otherwise, So that they may not become a burden to anyone, The father and mather of the internee, Oshar Goldman also were citizens of the U.S.A. (They are dead now, having died in New York.)

May I therefore, in view of the foregoing Circumstances, Solicit your assistance in Oringing thise two unfortunates to this country, for which please accept my heartfelt gratitude in advance, and may had blass you.
