This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of February 28, 1945, addressed to the President of the United States and transmitted for action to this Board.

In reply, it is suggested that you file Form I 133 with the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the Department of Justice, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The forms are obtainable in the New York office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. In filing such form you may state that you do so at the suggestion of the War Refugee Board.

Upon approval by the Department of Justice of your petition, the War Refugee Board will include the name of your husband in the lists of persons authorized to receive American immigration visas and eligible for exchange with Germany.

I know that you get many letters which do not reach you, but I earnestly hope that my case will not be the same.

I am an American citizen, and as such I was trying to bring my husband over here for the past six years from Bratislava, which is in Nazi dominated Slovakia. All my efforts, however, have been futile. I could hardly wait for the day when Slovakia will be liberated and I could be reunited with my beloved husband, That was till last Friday, when I received a card from a friend in Switzerland informing me that my husband has been deported from Slovakia to a Nazi concentration camp in Germany. His present address is.

My dear President, my husband in the concentration camp is in great danger. The knowledge of his ill fate makes me very bitter. We have to get him out of the hands of the Nazis, as soon as it is humanly possible, before it is too late. You have always proved to help the oppressed.
