It is my understanding that it is unnecessary to take any formal action by way of resignation from the War Refugee Board. I am sure you will be interested to know that the War Department recently indicated great interest in the War Refugee Board files as a possible source of information and evidence for use in connection with the Department's work with the War Crimes Commission. Certain reports and records in our files were turned over to Colonel Bernays who is working with Justice Jackson on this matter. He was so pleased with the material furnished him that he arranged for two of his men to go through all of our records. We have assigned one of our men to work closely with the War Department on this matter. In addition, we have instructed Mr. McClelland in Bern to make available any files he has to the local representative of General Donovan.

The following information has just been received in cables from Stockholm and Bern:

- 1. 5,000 Danish and Norwegian Jews arrived in Sweden April 18th from Germany. Their release from German concentration camps is the result of special negotiations conducted by Count Bernadotte, President of the Swedish Red Gross.
- 2. 69 Jewish refugees arrived in Switzerland April 19th. They came mainly from Bratislava.
- 3. The stock of War Refugee Board parcels in Goteburg has been exhausted with the shipment on April 18th of 140,000 percels to Lubeck.

For your information

General O'Dwyer has asked me to advise you that he called Mr. McClelland on the telephone this morning to get the letest report on our program from dwitzerland. Five trucks are lerving Switzerland Monday, April 9th, for Lubeck in the northern part of Germany, carrying 60 tons of parcels and fuel. Four more trucks are leaving Switzerland April 12th for the Dachau camps which are near Munich. 30,000 War Refugee Board parcels will go florward by railroad from Switzerland to an International Hed Gross depot near Havensburg, Germany. With this movement under way, it is contemplated that the 60,000 War Refugee Board parcels still in Switzerland will be cleared out of Switzerhand within the next two weeks. This clearly points up the need for the prisoner of war parcels which General C'Dayer reported to you yesterday had been arranged for with the War Department. Mr. McClelland was delighted with this news and he will work out at once all the details of repackaging in Switzerland. Mr. Katzki has arrived in Switzerland from Paris and will stay in Geneva for the next week to work closely with the International Red Cross on the details of this program.

With respect to evacuating refugees to Switzerland, McClelland reported that it is expected that a truck convoy will arrive in Switzerland very shortly bringing. 300 women, children and aged people. He stated that the Germans had not yet finally agreed to the use of our trucks for evacuating refugees to Switzerland.

Interested Jewish groups in this country have been deeply concerned over the publication on March 16 in the Jewish Telegraphic Agency of the following item:

"Geneva, Mar. 15. (JTA) -- The Nazi Government, through its news agency DNB, today issued a warning that all Jews now in German hands, as well as Jewish war prisoners who may be captured, will be killed in reprisal for the reported plan to send Germans to Russia as laborers to rebuild the areas devastated by the German Army.

accomplice Churchill undertook at the Yalta conference to surrender German war prisoners to the Soviet Union, then it is nothing but part of a devilish Jewish plan, the Nazi news agency said. Emphasizing that the Hitler government will retaliate, DNB added: Above all, we shall make every Jew who is, or who falls into our hands, pay for all others. When the war comes to an end, there will be no more Jews in Europe. **

The groups have been pressing for a warning and have telegraphed you, the Secretary of State and General O'Dwyer.

At our request, OWI and Federal Communications have checked this report and find that the following was released on March 12 by DNB for the German press:

"For all Germans battle cry is kill enemies like mad dogs! Murdering beasts deserve no better if Roosevelt now admits he and accomplice Churchill undertook in Yalta surrender German POW as slaves to Russia that too is par6 of diabolical Jewish plan. We will thoroughly upset machinations of slave drivers of Jewish

international. Or are these international criminals under impression we have no means of retaliation? Here too they will be taught lesson. Above all we will make every Jew in our hands or who falls into them pay for all others. When war comes to end there will be no more Jews in Europe. Again and again enemies have to admit we are daily becoming more fanatical and dogged.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY'S FILEDI

At 3:30 p.m., February 16, 1945, Secretary Morganthau met with Dr. Israel Goldstein of the American Jewish Conference who explained that Dr. Stephen Wise and Dr. Mahum Goldmann of the world Jewish Congress who had planned to be present were unavoidably delayed. Miss Hodel of the War Refuges Board also was present.

Dr. Goldstein outlined to the Secretary the present possibilities for refere of large numbers of Jews from disintegrating Germany. He pleaded that the situation called for extraordinary action if large-scale rescue were to be undertaken to save the Jews remaining in Masi-controlled areas from samihilation. Dr. Goldstein unged that a high official of the United States Government go to Switzerland immediately to undertake the action necessary to save these people and that such official be provided with adequate funds to finance the operations.

The Secretary explained to Dr. Goldstein that the Board was deeply concerned over the new situation developing in Germany with respect to the fate of the Jows, that the Board is new working on plans and possible courses of action designed to save as sany of these people as possible, and that the matter was of such urgency that he had arranged for a secting of the Board members early next week. He also explained that General O'Dwyer was planning to undertake a trip to Seitzerland and that he would be accompanied by Hise Hodel. On the question of funds, the Secretary assured Br. Coldstein that he was convinced that mufficient private funds would be available for the resone and relief work yet to be done. He stated that the main obstacle was not money but military considerations.

At this point Dr. Wise and Dr. Goldmann joined the meeting and the Secretary summarized to them the foregoing points which he had made to Dr. Goldmann. Dr. Goldmann raised the problem of clearances with the British and Mussians before action could be taken by this Government and the Secretary advised Dr. Goldmann that the first and most important problem was to get clear-cut decisions by this Government.

In connection with your meeting this afternoon with Dr. Stephen Wise and Dr. Nahum Goldman, you might be interested in the following excerpts from a letter General O'Dwyer received today from Dr. Goldmann:

"From various reports coming to us from Switzer-land, it appears to us that there are new opportunities for rescuing Jews from German-occupied countries. The release of 1200 internees from Theresienstadt who were brought by train all the way to the Swiss border is an indication of the possibilities. The disintegration of the Nazi Reich has created conditions where possibilities of rescue are opening up in a degree which did not hitherto exist. If this is true, coupled with the fact that this may be the last period of time in which large-scale rescue can be undertaken, and in the light of the danger that at the last moment before the Nazi collapse, they may annihilate the remaining Jews under their heels, as was done in Lodz and elsewhere, it seems to us that some extraordinary action must be undertaken in order to utilize whatever possibilities exist.

One of the difficulties in rescue activities in the past was due to the delay because there was lack of authority to act. We think that the time has come when someone with full authority to act, someone of high standing, empowered by the United States government, provided with the necessary funds, should proceed to Switzerland immediately to explore the possibilities on the spot and take the necessary action on his own responsibility. It would be ideal if you, yourself, would be prepared to undertake this, accompanied, if necessary, by one or two experts. It would be a high humanitarian mission, and may be a way for the War Refugee Board and the American government to achieve something substantial in the way of rescue and of saving thousands of Jews who may be exterminated as millions of others have been.

"I hope that you and the members of the War Refugee Board will consider this suggestion and find a way of acting on it."

General O'Dwyer asked me to bring this to your attention.
