My dear Mr. Worley:

I have your letter of September 15, 1944, in which you quoted from a letter addressed to you by Nrs. J. E. Scott, of Wheeler, Texas, concerning the temporary admission of approximately a thousand refusees to the United States.

Until they can be returned to their native lands at the end of the war, the persons in question are being cared for under appropriate security restrictions at the Emergency Refugee Shelter recently established at Fort Ontario. Oswego, New York. Contrary to Mrs. Scott's impression, they are not immigrants; and with the exception of one woman, the wife of a Yugoslav refugee, there are no Italians in the group.

Financial arrangements and other details of the plan are set forth in the enclosed copies of the President's message to Congress on June 12, his cablegram to Ambassador Nurphy in Algiers, and his memorandum to the agency heads concerned with the execution of the project. The refugees involved include persons of nineteen nationalities who, as victims of enemy persecution, had fled from their homelands to Southern Italy, where they constituted a burden to our military forces in an active theater of war operations, and military necessity required some temporary disposition of them. They were brought to the United States outside of the regular immigration procedure under arrangements similar to those by which prisoners of war have been brought here for oustody and by which civilian nationals of Germany, Italy, and Japan departed from Latin America were brought to this country for internment and ultimate repatriation to their own countries.

Since these refugees were not permitted to enter this country under the immigration laws, they obtained none of the rights of immigrants to be at liberty within the country or to remain here.

I am enclosing a copy of this letter for your convenience in replying to Mrs. Scott's letter.
