Dear Miss Tully,

It sounds a selfish matter on which I write this note, and I am half ashamed to intrude a personal request at such a time. But I think that Mrs. Roosevelt will forgive it and you will not misunderstand.

The last time I saw the President, he promised to give me a photograph of himself, and I need not say how much I should value it if effect might be given to his wish.

Do you think you could mention it to Mrs. Roosevelt at a convenient time? I would really love to have his picture, which would remind me for always of an association and friendship to which I shall look back as one of the privileges of my life.
