Writes to Miss Tully referring to the President's having suggested that he call on him with his sister Archduchess Adelheid during the latter's next stay in Washington. Says his sister will arrive on Jan. 31st, to remain in Washington, until Feb. 4th or 5th, and asks if it could be arranged for them to see the President. He and his sister will have some friends in for a little party on Feb. 2nd and invites Miss Tully to come.-- On Feb. 8, 1944 Miss Tully wrote to Archduke Otto telling him that the President was indeed sorry that he was not able to see Archduchess Adelheid while she was in Washington, and explaining how very busy the President is during these difficult days. Miss Tully also expresses regret that she did not have the pleasure of meeting his sister while she was in Washington. She also expressed her appreciation "for that very lovely wood carving of the Virgin and Child which you sent to me for Christmas."
